Compulsory Team Co-ordinator's Meetings:

Please note that each evening at 6pm (or after presentations) there will be a compulsory team Co-ordinators' meeting to provide competitors with important information about the next day's competition. It is essential that each school provides **one** representative for those meetings. We would also like each school to pre-nominate their representatives prior to the meetings each day and provide contact details for this representative. This person will be the only contact with the Event Organisers for the following day's competition.

Conditions of Entry:

This event is being conducted under the rules as per the IQ Handbook 2017 and EA and FEI Rules where applicable. It is your responsibility to read your Handbook. Riders/Horses must be registered with the Inter-School Queensland Sport Committee. **ALL Horses MUST BE EA LIFE REGISTERED** to compete at this Championship event. The organising committee reserves the right to accept and/or reject entries. Competitors are reminded that Medication Control (swabbing) can occur at <u>any</u> event run under Equestrian Australia rules and regulations. For more information please go to the Equestrian Australia website (<u>www.equestrian.org.au</u>). For the list of Prohibited Substances please go to <u>www.feicleansport.org</u>. For information in relation to travel permits & spraying please contact your local Department of Primary Industries.

PIC Number/Horse Health Declaration Form:

It has been a requirement of Equestrian Queensland since the beginning of 2012 that all members submit a PIC number for the property where their horse is located. It is a requirement for entry to this event that all competitors provide a current horse health declaration form for each horse entering the showgrounds. The horse health declaration can be found at

http://www.qld.equestrian.org.au/sites/default/files/EQ%20Horse%20Health%20De claration.pdf. This completed form must be handed into the event office (as per event map) on arrival at the venue. Please ensure you have provided a PIC number and that you enter this PIC number on your nomination form.

*A riders arm band will be issued on receipt of the Horse health Dec form to the event office. This armband must be worn to allow the rider to pass through gear check during this event. NO ARMBAND = NO RIDE.

Primary Riders:

A Primary School rider in IQ is any rider who is enrolled in a Queensland school from Prep to year 6. This includes any rider who is 12 years old or turning 12 in the calendar year of the competition.

Photo Release Waiver

By participating in this event you are consenting to your child/children being photographed or filmed. EQ may use these images for promotional use in the Interschool program, this includes but is not limited to, use on the EQ website, marketing material and in all forms of media. I understand photos in which my child/children appear may be submitted to EQ, partners and stakeholders who may also use these images for the purpose of promoting their association with EQ.

TO COMPETE AT NATIONALS - PLEASE NOTE:

If you are **in Primary School** and are **13 years old** or you are **turning 13 before December 31**st **this year** and you want to qualify for a position on the Queensland team to go to Nationals **you need to ride in Secondary** competition at these championships as Primary competition at National Level is for riders up to and including 12 years of age in the calendar year of that competition.

Rider Numbers:

Correct IQ numbers must be shown on **both** sides of the horse when competing.

The IQ number should also be displayed on the horse at any time the horse is taken out of its stable or yard, being led, being ridden or lunged on the grounds at an event.

Soundness:

The Judges are required to satisfy themselves regarding soundness of all horses and therefore have the authority to stop an unsound horse during the competition or from competing – any disputes in this area will be considered by the ground jury on the day and/or the Technical Delegate. For Dressage there is no appeal against this decision.

Anti Doping:

Now is the time for a reminder that the use of prohibited substances in your horse is not tolerated and riders must be aware that swabbing of horses may occur at random and will be conducted at any of these events. You should consult with your Vet regarding any current treatment and should be aware of the potential risk of self administration of prohibited substances.

The FEI publishes a caution against the use of herbal supplements and products of which the ingredients are unknown. The use of any substance to affect the performance of a horse in a calming (tranquillising) or an energising (stimulant) manner is forbidden. The use of a calming product during competition may also have important safety consequences. All controlled or banned substances can be found here: http://www.equestrian.org.au/medication-control as well there is a smart phone FEI App you can download to your phone or access the web site her http://www.fei.org/fei/cleansport/horses.

Behaviour:

When representing their school and while on competition grounds, all competitors must obey their school rules and competition etiquette. Those not adhering to this, risk elimination from the competition. Damage to any third party by anyone at the venue of the competition will be the responsibility of the adult involved or the parents or guardians of those who caused the damage. In particular IQ and the EA accept no responsibility relating to the use of motorised vehicles on the grounds over the course of the competition.

EA Codes of Conduct must be observed by all competitors, their parents/guardians, coaches and all volunteers, during this event. Those who fail to do so risk elimination from the competition or being banned from the grounds:

No motor bikes, four-wheelers, trikes and other vehicles to be used on showgrounds, other than by the OC

Push bike riders:

Are required to wear approved helmets at all times and must stay away from stables, all horse warm up and competition areas.

Dogs -zero tolerance for dogs not kept under control(under control being either an audible nuisance or a nuisance to other dogs humans or horses)

The committees decision will be final with nuisance dogs asked to leave the grounds immediately. Dogs must be on leads at all time and remain in the camping area.

Saddlery and Equipment:

MARSHALLING/GEAR CHECK. A designated Marshalling/gear check point will be made available and is compulsory for all competitors prior to their entry in **each phase of every class.** Competitors are to check into Marshalling 15 minutes prior to ride time. No competitor may not compete until they have been cleared through marshalling/gear check. NOTE: Armbands must be worn to be cleared through gear check.

All equipment must comply with EA regulations for the particular discipline. It is the responsibility of the competitor and/or parents to ensure that saddlery and equipment is in good repair, meets the relevant safety standards, is fitted appropriately and meets the regulations for that event. It is not the responsibility of the volunteers at Marshalling/gear check. Please refer to the illustrations of allowable equipment and information in the EA Rule Books and the information specific to each discipline in the IQ 2017 handbook.

Dress for Riders:

Riders MUST ride in their school equestrian uniform and helmets of AS/NZS 3838 or EN 1384 VGI must be worn at all times whilst mounted. As per the EA General Regulations, Equestrian Australia highly recommends the use of helmets that conform to Australian Standard AS/NZS 3838, as this standard provides for more stringent testing and further periodic retesting. A saddlecloth depicting the school emblem should be worn. See the IQ handbook for specific uniform and dress requirements for all disciplines.

Horses:

Horses are not to be ridden by anyone other than the rider nominated on the draw at events from midday on the day prior to the event commencing until conclusion of the final discipline on the last day of the event. This ruling applies even if a horse has completed its competitions at an event. The exception to this ruling is that a horse can be ridden by more than one sibling rider at an event in different disciplines as long as each rider has their unique IQ number for that particular horse and the horse does not compete in more than the maximum number of tests/sections allowed in the day by EA discipline rules (eg no more than 3 dressage tests in one day).

Horse abuse in any form will not be tolerated. If horse abuse is determined the athlete will be disqualified from the competition. The sighting of blood on the horse during a test, whether wet or dry, will entail elimination and/or investigation by the Ground Jury/Technical Delegate based upon the Sport Rules of the discipline involved.

Entries and Substitutions: Qualifying Period: 9/6/2016 to 12/6/2017

Providing that each combination is qualified:

- **For Dressage** –Competitors may enter a maximum of two classes. This could be two horses in one class each, in the same or different classes, or one horse over two consecutive levels. A class is two dressage tests at one level.
 - For Dressage Freestyle Competitors may enter only one class per horse and must compete in the dressage phase.
- **For Jumping** Competitors may enter a maximum of two classes. This means a rider may enter either one horse over two consecutive levels or two horses in one class each. If entering two horses, they may be entered in the same class.
- For Showman Competitors may enter a maximum of two class per rider
- For Show Horse Competitors may enter a maximum of two horses.

Note all year 12 riders are asked to indicate this in their nominations.

Riders may enter a maximum of 5 classes per horse across the State Championships. However, for scheduling reasons, riders may have to make a choice between classes if there is a time clash. The total classes allowed will not include Eventing or Combined Training as they are held at a separate event. Dressage Freestyles will count as one class.

On approval from the IQ committee, riders may substitute an alternative qualified horse up until the start of competition for the day providing details of the IQ horse/rider registration is presented to the organising committee. No rider may be substituted for another.

Important note for riders wishing to compete in both the Show Horse and Showjumping events: Rings WILL NOT BE HELD for riders coming from Show Horse to

Showjumping or vice versa.

Entry fees:

There will be no refund for scratching after close of entries unless accompanied by a veterinary/medical certificate. Exemptions on medical and/or veterinary grounds will be at the sole discretion of the organising committee and will require documentary evidence certified by a recognised and qualified medical practitioner/veterinarian and must be specific and relevant to the request for an exemption. A 30% administration fee will apply on the total entry including Camp/Stable fees. Certificates are to be received by the OC within 7 days of commencement of competition. No request for an exemption will be considered after commencement of the relevant discipline.

In the event of cancellation of the competition or part thereof due to any circumstance beyond the control of the IQ organising committee, entry fees will be refunded less \$30 administration costs to help defray costs.

Competition schedule:

The competition times in the published schedule are correct at the time of publication and should be taken as a guide for competitors only. The final schedule draw will be posted on the morning of each competition day

Rings may run early due to scratching's. Please be attentive to announcements to this effect on the day. Riders may be required to ride earlier.

Riders who are late, without prior approval from the OC (e.g. let the office know if you are held up in another ring), may be excluded from the class.

Disputes:

No competitors or parents are to directly approach any judges, stewards, course builders or any other officials or volunteers before, during or after the competition with disputes or complaints. Any disputes, complaints or queries during the competition must be lodged in writing with the TD or ground jury through the Team Captain or School Convenor with a fee of \$50 within 30 minutes of the event which gave rise to the objection. The decision of the Technical Delegate/Ground Jury will be final and may not be appealed. General questions can be asked in relation to errors on results or in relation to the running of the event through the event office.

Back Protectors:

Back Protectors for jumping elements are not compulsory under EA rules. The IQ strongly recommends their use in the interest of safety.

Unmounted Presentations:

Will be held at the conclusion of each day's event. **It is compulsory for all riders to attend presentations** on the days they compete. This is considered appropriate protocol for a State Championship and the committee expects schools and parents to support this expectation. All riders must be in full uniform (including helmet or team caps). Failure to comply with this rule will result in any awards, points or ribbons forfeited. Exemptions to this ruling are possible if sought in writing or e-mail prior to the event from the IQ Committee (interschool@equestrianqld.com.au) or in the case of Emergency during the competition by contacting the discipline convenor via mobile.

A register will be kept in the office for those requesting exemption from presentations and the Organising Committee will advise whether the request has been accepted during the day of competition requested. School convenors will be asked to check off rider attendance before presentation begins each day.

Please refer to the information about presentation attendance in the 2017 IQ Handbook.

Neither the organising committee, Interschool Queensland, the Equestrian Federation of Australia Queensland Branch, the Toowoomba Regional Council nor the Toowoomba Showgrounds and Equestrian Centre accepts any liability for any accident, damage, injury, illness to riders, spectators, horses, grounds or any other persons or property whatsoever in consideration of entries being accepted. No entries will be accepted unless riders and parents have signed the Acknowledgment and Indemnity waiver.

Scoring of Trophy Points:

The scoring for Champions, Teams and Overall Trophies are outlined in the current IQ 2017 Handbook.

Helpers: - PLEASE READ CHANGES BELOW CAREFULLY - THESE HAVE CHANGED FOR THE 2017 STATE EVENT.

Each rider will be required to nominate a helper for the event and a helper's roster will be published in the week prior to the event. The final roster will be posted on the morning of each competition day.

It is the responsibility of each rider and their helper to ensure that they check this roster and complete their nominated tasks or find an appropriate substitute person to do so. A rider competing in more than one discipline may be allocated a job per discipline.

If a job that a rider is assigned to is not completed in full by the nominated helper for that rider, the rider will NOT be eligible for prizes at the state competition and will be automatically considered as riding HC for the state championship event. This will mean that the rider who's assigned job was not completed will also NOT be eligible for a position on the Queensland State Team to compete at the Australian Interschool National Championships under any circumstances.

If you do not wish to perform a job at the Queensland State Championship event, there is an option to pay \$ 80.00 per class that a rider enters to have the riders job waived. This will be an option on Nominate in the nomination process.

PLEASE NOTE:

IF THE NOMINATED RIDER'S HELPER FAILS TO ARRIVE FOR DUTY AS PER THE HELPERS ROSTER THE RIDER'S NAME WILL BE FORWARDED TO THE IQ COMMITTEE ON THE DAY OF THE COMPETITION AND THE RIDER WILL NOT BE ELIGIBLE FOR PLACINGS OR POINTS FOR THAT COMPETITION

Please do not put the committee or your child in this situation. If everyone lends a hand it means less work for everyone.

Classes D10 and D11 Make up the Small Tour Championship and is deemed as one class. Riders can enter one part but the Overall Championship is D10 and D11 combined.

Intermediate is defined as those athletes turning 12 (if in Secondary school), 13 and 14 years old in the current year. **Senior** divisions are for those athletes turning 15, 16, 17 and 18 years of age in the current year.

The dressage competition is run under EA and FEI rules and the IQ 2017 handbook. Providing qualifying criteria is met, riders may nominate for a maximum of two classes i.e. one horse at two consecutive levels OR two horses in one class each. If entering two horses, they may be entered in the same class.

*Classes D12, D13 and D14 will not qualify riders for selection to the 2017 National Championships but WILL count towards rider, team and school points.

Classes D1 and D2 are for all riders in Prep-6 and D3 to D11 are for riders in years 7-12. However primary riders who are turning 13 years of age in 2017 who wish to be considered for selection in the National Championships must enter in classes D3 to D11. Classes D12, D13 and D14 are open to para-equestrians, RDA riders and Riders with a Disability.

Riders who have an EA Exemption card may ride in classes D1-D11 and/or classes D12-D14. All PE riders at the time of nomination must send copies of their classification card and any other exemptions to the convenor, Karla Farrell at karlashane@bigpond.com.au prior to acceptance of the nomination.

Qualifying criteria for Dressage: As per Section 7.7 in the IQ 2017 Handbook. Class numbers will be limited and entries will be ranked to determine acceptances for any classes with entries over the class limit of 35. Please advise of any withdrawals as soon as possible so that riders on the reserve list may be notified.

Prizes:

Ribbons will be awarded to 6th place in each class.

Overall placings will receive ribbons to 6th place with Rugs to Champions and Saddle Clothes to Reserve Champions.

Primary and Secondary Teams will also be awarded to 6th place. No rugs for team placings.

Qualifying criteria for Freestyle Dressage: Riders must compete in the Dressage Phase of competition. As per Section 7.7 in the IQ 2017 Handbook. Class numbers <u>will</u> be limited and entries will be ranked to determine acceptances for any classes with entries over the class limit.

Prizes:

Ribbons will be awarded to 6^{th} place.

Dressage Freestyle will qualify riders for selection to the Freestyle component of the 2017 National Championships if this class is offered at the event, but will NOT count towards rider, team or school points. There will be ribbons for placegetters to sixth place but no championship awards or rugs.

No callers for the dressage phase of showman either primary or secondary. ** Test S3 may be ridden sitting or rising trot.

Qualifying Criteria:

Riders are required to submit their best two results on the nominated horse (both results must be at the same level, ie. 2 results from the 4 Phase 60cm) from the period of 8 June 2016 until 5 June 2017.

RIDERS PLEASE NOTE: ONLY RIDERS WITH 2 QUALIFYING RESULTS WILL BE ACCEPTED FOR THE STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS

There are two exceptions to this rule. These are:

- 1 Riders from regions requiring reduced numbers of qualifiers may submit their best performance and it will be doubled to allow for ranking.
- Year 12 students are only required to submit one result as recognition of the work and commitment needed in this year.

For riders who were unable to obtain correct qualifying criteria as set out above due to extreme circumstances, an email containing full explanations must be forwarded to the IQ committee (interschool@equestrianqld.com.au) prior to closure of State Championship nominations for consideration.

NOTE: Riders must compete at the highest level they have qualified at

during the year.

Prizes:

Ribbons will be awarded for all classes to 6th place. Primary and Secondary Teams will also be awarded to 6th place. There is a trophy for overall Champion Primary and Overall Champion Secondary team.

Champions and Reserve Champions will be awarded for each class and there are trophies and rugs for champions and saddlecloths and sashes for reserve champions.

Providing qualifying criteria is met and that the schedule allows, riders may be able to nominate for a maximum of two show jumping classes. This means that a rider may enter either one horse over two consecutive levels or two horses in one class each. If entering two horses, they may be entered in the same class. If you are unsure if qualifying criteria has been met, please email Tracey Sexton at traceysexton7@gmail.com to confirm.

Please refer to the 2017 IQ Handbook under showjumping for qualifying criteria.

If you are in Primary School and are 13 years old or you are turning 13 before December 31st this year and you want to qualify for a position on the Queensland team to go to Nationals you must enter the Secondary 90cm.

A Primary School rider in IQ is any rider who is enrolled in a Queensland school from Prep to year 6. This includes any rider who is 13 years old or turning 13 in the calendar year of the competition.

Interschool Show Horse consists of classes for Show Horse, Show Hunter and Working Hunter. Each class has three (3) phases. At the beginning of the class, there is a compulsory circle that all horse and riders must present for. All classes have an In-hand presentation, Rider phase (judging the rider) and Ridden phase (judging the horse). Working Hunter includes a Jumping phase.

Each phase is judged and placed separately and the points earned by adding the ranking from each phase together will determine the championship placing. (The same system that is used for Dressage and Showjumping)

The same horse/rider combination must complete all phases in the order specified in a timed draw as determined by the Organising Committee.

The Rules for Interschool Show Horse have been designed to correspond with the National Show Horse Rules wherever possible, however some variations (like the wearing of a school uniform) have been necessary to meet Interschool competition requirements.

Judged under current EA SHOW HORSE RULES.

- Riders must complete all phases in the class on the same horse.
- Rider and horse/pony combination may compete in one class only, and must choose between show horse, show hunter or working hunter.
- Riders may ride more than one horse on the day in the Show Horse, Show Hunter or Working Hunter class.
- Each class will have a timed draw and all riders will complete an individual workout for each phase.
- Safety of all Interschool athletes is paramount, thus the Organising Committee has the right to determine in which order the phases will be held.
- Ribbons will be awarded for led, rider and ridden classes and Championship (combined score across phases).
- The Championship will be determined by a ranking of 30pts to 1 being awarded for finishing places in each phase and then being added together for a total of a maximum of 90 points possible to decide the winner.
- Competitors may walk the jumping course for the Working Hunter Competition prior to the start of the first held phase of the class for the competition.
- At IQ if the incorrect equipment is worn into an arena in front of the judge, the
 rider will receive a **ZERO mark** for that phase, ie if spurs are worn in the Led class
 or if gaiters or long boots are worn in the Rider class by riders under 18 years of
 age.

Dress, Saddlery and Equipment

Will largely be as per National Show Horse Rules with some exceptions specifically for Interschool Show Horse competitions:

- A number must be displayed at all times in each phase.
- Short boots with heels should be worn in the rider phase unless the rider is over 18 years, in other phases long boots, gaiters/ chapettes are permitted A score of ZERO will be awarded where riders under 18 wear long boots, gaiters/chapettes in the rider class phase
- Either a dressage, show, jumping or all-purpose saddle is allowed.
- Martingales, bearing, side or running reins of any kind are not permitted
- Jumping Boots (including over-reach boots) are allowed for the jumping phase in Working Hunter only
- Safety vests/back protectors may be worn in the jumping phase of working hunter
- Horse and ponies must be ridden in a snaffle bridle in the working hunter (Jump) phase of the working hunter class but may be ridden in a double bridle for all other phases.
- Spurs may be worn, but must be removed for the In-Hand phase. A score of ZERO will be awarded where riders wear spurs in the In-Hand phase.

Show Horse and Show Hunter Special Rule:

- Riders must decide if their mount is either a Show Horse, Show Hunter or Working Hunter.
- They cannot compete the same mount in more than one class.
- Show Horse classes will be conducted under the National Show Horse Rules and Guidelines, which can be obtained from the website.
- **A Show Horse** is a quality, comfortable, well mannered, educated riding horse that is sound. The horse should be excellently presented and give the appearance of being a pleasure to handle, watch and ride. It is entirely up to the talent of the rider and those connected with the horse to prepare and show it in the way in which it looks and performs best.
- The Show Horse should work with a nicely rounded back, naturally elevated in front and head flexed at the poll. The contact should be light and even.
- A Show Horse must give the impression of covering the ground easily and fluently.
 The horse must be well balanced and work without any obvious effort by the rider
 or any untoward resistance from the horse. The whole picture should be pleasing
 to the eye. The Show Horse should go forward with controlled free forward
 movement, the correct bend and an even rhythm in all paces at a tempo chosen
 by the rider.
- **Show Hunter Classes**: The main criteria for a Show Hunter is that it exhibit correct conformation, 3 clear paces and faultless education, each individual should therefore be able to cover the ground in a workout which always includes a gallop. Manners are extremely important and small misdemeanours, which may be overlooked on a Show Horse, should be penalised in the Show Hunter.

- Show Hunter classes are to be ridden in school uniforms for Interschool competitions. Judges/ stewards may need to classify horses to ensure that the right type competes in the Show Hunter classes.
- Once a horse has been shown as a Show Hunter it must continue to be shown in these classes for the whole competition year. There are Show Hunter classes at the State Championships separate from the hack classes.

Number of Horses

• Riders may ride up to 2 horses on the day in the Show Horse, Show Hunter or Working Hunter class.

Workouts

• Set workouts for all classes are available on the IQ Website. And will also be sent out with the draws.

Qualifying Criteria:

Riders are required to submit their best two results on the nominated horse from the qualifying period.

RIDERS PLEASE NOTE: ONLY RIDERS WITH 2 QUALIFYING RESULTS WILL BE ACCEPTED FOR THE STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS.

There are two exceptions to this rule: These are:

- Year 12 students are only required to submit one result as recognition of the work and commitment needed in this year. (See IQ Handbook P59)
- Riders from CQ, NQ and FNQ are as per year 12, however if no IQ competitions are run locally you can nominate using Ag show results for. (See IQ Handbook P59)

Important note for riders wishing to compete in both the Show Horse and Showjumping events:

Rings MAY NOT BE ABLE TO BE HELD for riders coming from Showjumping to Show Horse or vice versa.

YOU MAY BE REQUIRED TO MAKE A PREFERENCE ON THE DAY.

IQ State Championships Qualifying Criteria - **UPDATED FOR 2017**.

Qualifying Period: AS PER THE STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS SCHEDULE:-Qualifying Scores will be accepted from "IQ Competitions" that are attended in the 12 Months prior to Close of Entries for the State Championship Event.

An IQ Competition is an event run by our member schools or Young Riders committee or that has been accepted as a "Tag On" IQ qualifying event by the IQ committee and appears on the IQ Calendar of Events. (NB:-If it is not on the Calendar it does not count as a qualifier unless you are a rider in a regional area and other scores may be considered. – please see below.)

Dressage

The qualifying period is the 12 months preceding the closing date of entries for State Championship (see section 14.2).

- 1. All riders should submit a minimum of 3 IQ test scores from at least 2 IQ competitions in the level at which you wish to compete.
- 2. At least one of the submitted scores is required to be:
- a) A minimum of 58% for Preliminary/Novice level b) A minimum of 55% for all other levels
- 3. If classes reach maximum numbers, the 3 scores will be added together and divided by 3 to get an average score to allow for balloting of the top riders who will be invited to compete.
- 4. Year 12 riders may submit 2 test scores from any IQ competition at their chosen level but one must be a minimum of 58% for Preliminary/Novice level or 55% for all other levels. These scores will be divided by 2 for balloting purposes.

5. Riders from regions requiring reduced numbers of qualifiers may submit 2 test scores from any IQ competition at their chosen level but one must be a minimum of 58% for Preliminary/Novice level or 55% for all other levels. These scores will be divided by 2 for balloting purposes. EA run competitions will be able to be considered in these regions. If riders do not have EA scores, they are encouraged to send in any performance scores they have for the IQ Convenor's consideration. Regions requiring reduced numbers of qualifiers are listed in section 3.2.2

Riders are reminded that ONLY events listed on the IQ calendar are approved IQ qualifying events.

Competitions will be limited to 35 riders however there may be fewer accepted at the discretion of the OC depending on scheduling constraints and entry standards. The OC reserves the right to refuse an entry if it is deemed to be of insufficient standard for the event and the level entered. If nominations exceed the quota set by the OC, a reserve list may be kept.

Whilst all performances of 58% (Pre/Nov) and 55% (Elem & above) and above will be considered in the nomination process for the State Championships, this

does not imply that an average of these scores guarantees a place. Depending on balloting, it is highly unlikely that riders with only 58% average will receive a place in the highly competitive classes at Preliminary and Novice level.

Jumping For riders wishing to be accepted for selection to compete at the State Championships the following is required:

For riders who were unable to obtain correct qualifying criteria as set out above due to extreme circumstances - a letter containing full explanations must be forwarded to the IQ committee prior to closure of State Championship nominations for consideration.

In the event of excessive nominations, preference will be given to riders in the following order:

- 1. Horse/rider combinations nominating for Australian Interschool Championships qualifying classes with correct IQ qualifiers as listed above;
- 2. Horse/rider combinations nominating for non-qualifying classes with correct IQ qualifiers as listed above;
- 3. All other riders will be placed on a reserve list in order of qualifying results.

Show Horse

It is important to note that the Show Horse competition in IQ requires that qualifying results are valid for each unique horse/rider combination. This means that only results achieved by the IQ rider and that horse can be submitted for consideration as qualifying results. Results achieved by the IQ horse with another rider are not valid and this means that horses cannot qualify for the State Championships if they have been ridden by another rider.

Qualification criteria is as follows:

- 1. Minimum of 2 best results at the same class level from any 2 IQ Show Horse competitions.
- 2. The results will be ranked to allow for a balloting process (e.g. 1st place will receive 10 points down to 1 point for 10th place and 1 point per rider after 10th). The combinations ranking points will be added together to get a list of qualified riders in rank order to allow for this discipline to be capped at State Championships if required.
- 3. Year 12 riders may submit their best performance and it will be doubled to allow for ranking.
- 4. Riders from regions requiring reduced numbers of qualifiers As per Year 12, however if no IQ competitions are run locally you can apply to the discipline convenor using Ag Show scores and EA Dressage Scores and Pony Club performances for special consideration to attend States. Regions requiring reduced numbers of qualifiers are listed in section 3.2.2
