Need to Know

National Futures and Youth Squads Applications

Equestrian Australia has recently changed the way in which the Youth and Futures Squads are selected. To apply for either of these squads, athletes who believe they are eligible are required to submit an Expression of Interest form which can be downloaded from http://www.equestrian.org.au/dressage-squads.

- The National Futures Squad is for promising horses aged from 5-9 years of age who have been identified as having potential to be ready for future Major Championships.
- The National Youth Squad is a squad for riders aged between 16-25 who show potential to develop the physical and emotional characteristics of an elite dressage competitor.

As part of their submission, athletes must provide a letter of support from an A Level or higher dressage judge. This letter is to state that the judge has seen the combination in question and is happy to state that, in their opinion, the squad application is worthy of consideration.

- For the Futures Squad, this letter should make reference to the horse's potential for higher level performance as demonstrated by quality of paces—walk, trot and canter, correctness of training and overall impression as a dressage horse.
- For the Youth Squad, the letter should make reference to the rider's potential for higher level performance as demonstrated by the rider's position and seat, correctness and effect of the aids. Whilst part of the selection for the Youth Squad requires the combination to be competing at a certain level, this squad is particularly aimed towards the skill of the rider, not necessarily the future potential of the combination.

These letters can be forwarded directly to the National Office and remain confidential.

Blue Cards—Required for all Officials and Coaches in Qld

- It is an Equestrian Qld requirement that all officials and coaches in Qld hold a current Blue Card.

Evaluation of Piaffe (Intermediate A and Intermediate B):

From the Dressage Judge General Stephen Clarke (7 April 2014) - Guidelines for the evaluation of Piaffe in Intermediate A and Intermediate B.

We have to remain true to the principle that it must be possible to award the maximum score, '10', for every exercise that is asked for in the tests, provided that the quality can be regarded as 'excellent'.

Therefore, if we see perfectly regular, highly expressive piaffe steps that are 'allowed to travel forwards 2 metres', as in the A and B tests, we should be prepared to award the maximum score.

If however, the piaffe is shown 'more or less in place' as in the Grand Prix, and is performed in an 'excellent' way, we should still be prepared to award the maximum score, as the guidelines for the A and B tests only state that it is 'allowed' to advance for up to two metres. Nowhere is it stated that the piaffe 'must' advance two metres.

Need to Know

New FEI Tests from 1 January, 2014 for Intermediate A, Intermediate B, Intermediate 11, Grand Prix and Grand Prix Special. To download go to http://www.fei.org/fei/your-role/organisers/dressage/tests.

New Tests & Level of Judge Required:

As of 1 January, 2014 there are new versions of the Intermediate 11, Grand Prix & Grand Prix Special tests available. Prix St Georges and Intermediate 1 remain unchanged. In addition to these new versions, the FEI has introduced two new tests that lie between Intermediate 1 and Intermediate 11. These are known as Intermediate A and Intermediate B, and are stepping stones up to the Big Tour tests. Australia already has a test at this level called the Big Tour Entry Level Test. This test will still be available for clubs to use during 2014.

Clubs will have two tests at Small Tour (Prix St Georges and Intermediate 1), three tests at the entry level to choose from (EA Big Tour Entry Level Test, FEI Intermediate A and FEI Intermediate B), and three tests at the Big Tour (Intermediate 11, Grand Prix and Grand Prix Special).

Clubs and judges must be aware that A level judges are required to judge any of the Big Tour entry level tests, that is, EA Big Tour Entry Level Test, FEI Intermediate A and FEI Intermediate B.



Intermediate II Test—Clarification for 2014 from the ADC

The FEI have reinstated the 2014 Intermediate II test. This test is new along with the Intermediate A and Intermediate B tests for 2014. These three tests have been adopted by EA as national tests. It is up to organising committees how they wish to use them nationally, but it is still a recommendation from the ADC to use the Intermediate A and B tests to encourage the step from Intermediate I to Grand Prix level.

Freestyle Tests—Penalty for Riding Under or Over Time

The ADC have noted that the penalty for riding over or under time on the EA Freestyle Tests is not correct—neither on the test sheets nor in the Rule Book. To bring us clearly in line with the FEI penalty for this timing error or –0.5% from the TOTAL Artistic Score, the following changes are occurring:

- The 2015 Rule Book, 6.1 last dot point will read "If the test is shorter or longer than stipulated on the test sheet a penalty of 0.5% will be incurred from the total artistic percentage of each judge".
- The EA Freestyle Tests have been corrected and are now available from the EA website.

Advance 5.2—Clarification

Movement 14: KX on diagonal

Near X Develop very collected canter working half pirouette right approx 2 metres Proceed collected canter

Movement 18: HX on diagonal

Near X Develop very collected canter working half pirouette left approx 2 metres Proceed collected canter

The movement is quite clear— it says 'KX' and 'HX' – near the centre line would be between KX and HX – not beyond X. It is expected that for the highest mark it must be at or before X.


If the rider crosses the centre line by more than 1 metre this will be considered an error of course. Given that it is a mirror image movement the bell should be sounded and the rider advised so as to avoid it happening the next time.

Austalian Dressage Committee

Directive on Levels, Starting Possibilities and new EA FEI Medium Tour Freestyle

Effective 1 May, 2014

INTRODUCTION

- 1. This Directive is effective 1 May 2014.
- 2. The new Intermediate A, B and EA BTELT have been well received by riders and are perfect for the training program of the horses I have judged in them. It is clear that these tests have been very much needed as the bridge between Intermediate I and GP level.
- 3. However the ADC has had many questions from organisers of official shows on how to develop their schedules with these new tests and keep within the rules of "no more than 2 FEI level competitions per day, may include a freestyle". And, most importantly, respect the level of the combinations and not over face them, but provide appropriate competition.
- 4. ADC has also developed an Intro GP "Medium " Tour Freestyle. This has been developed jointly with FEI judge Katrina Wuest and will be a proposal to the FEI Dressage Committee for 2015. This will be effective from 1 May 2014.

This directive is intended to assist OCs and Clubs to develop their competition schedules with clear guidelines for riders.

1. Definition of Levels

At present on page 10 of the Rule Book, there is a definition of Levels for Official Tests.

ADC has agreed to update that from 1 May 2014 to as follows.

3. The ADC has developed the **EA FEI Medium Tour Freestyle**.

The ADC trusts that this will provide clear direction for organising committees and clubs. There will be an opportunity for feedback from SDAs at the annual meeting between the ADC and SDAs in October with the view to including these directives into the 2015 Dressage Rule Book.

Working in Heat

Advice for Clubs/Organisations to assist in preventing heat illness amongst volunteers, officials, coaches, etc., working outdoors in hot weather.

Purpose

This document provides practical advice for clubs/organisations to deal with avoiding heat illness and related health and safety problems that may arise involving coaches, officials, volunteers and the like engaged to assist clubs/organisations at their events. It contains suggested actions and measures that may prevent or minimise the likelihood of heat illness.

Background

Heat illness occurs when the body cannot sufficiently cool itself. Factors that contribute to this include:

- temperature
- humidity
- amount of air movement
- clothing
- physical activity (metabolic heat load)

Heat illness covers a range of medical conditions that can arise when the body is unable to properly cope with working in heat. These conditions include:

- heat stroke a life threatening condition that requires immediate first aid and medical attention
- fainting
- heat exhaustion
- heat cramps
- rashes (also called prickly heat)
- heat fatigue
- worsening of pre-existing illnesses and conditions

Signs and symptoms of heat illness include feeling sick, nauseous, dizzy or weak. Clumsiness, collapse and convulsions may also be experienced as a result of heat illness.

People with these signs or symptoms need to seek immediate medical attention.

What is the risk of heat illness occurring?

There are several factors that need to be considered when determining if there is a risk of heat illness to officials, coaches and volunteers and ways to protect them.

When identifying heat hazards and controlling heat risks, officials, coaches and volunteers likely to be exposed to heat must be consulted.

Identifying heat illness hazards

Air temperature alone cannot be used to determine whether there is a risk of heat illness. The key risk factors that need to be taken into account are:

- air temperature
- humidity
- radiant heat (from the sun or other sources such as the surface of an arena)
- air movement or wind speed
- workload (nature of the work and duration)


• physical fitness of the official, coach or volunteer (including acclimatisation and any pre-existing conditions e.g. overweight, heart/circulatory diseases, skin diseases or use of certain medicines)

Is there a risk of heat illness?

If there is a risk of heat illness at the competition or clinic, it must be controlled as best as possible. Advice may be sought from a person competent in heat assessment. They can provide recommendations about how the risk can be controlled.

Any assessment should include an appropriate heat stress index. A commonly used and recognised index is the Wet Bulb Globe Temperature (WBGT). The WBGT takes into account air temperature, radiant heat, humidity and air movement.

If a risk of heat illness is identified, control measures need to be put in place.



Preventing heat illness


The risk can also be minimised by modifying workload and addressing environmental factors. This may include:

- rescheduling coaching/clinic/competition times so the hot tasks are performed during the cooler part of the day
- doing the coaching/clinics at a different location (ie. move from outdoor arena to an indoor arena)
- reducing the time spent doing hot tasks (eg job rotation, adequate breaks in shade)
- arranging for more officials, coaches and volunteers to share the job
- providing extra shade areas (i.e. at an outdoor arena with no shade hire a small marquee for the coach to sit in to instruct from or likewise for volunteers to take regular breaks in)
- arrange for cold water and cold hydrating fluids to be taken directly to officials, coaches and volunteers at regular intervals, as well as providing a ready supply at designated shade/break areas

Thermal comfort

Thermal comfort is subjective, but generally, conditions considered comfortable for people working indoors and doing light work are:

- air temperature (dry bulb temperature) 23 to 26 degrees C
- relative humidity 30 to 60 per cent.



Role of Dressage Stewards at events

"Help, Prevent, Intervene'

Protecting the public image of our Sport has become most important over the last few years and as organisers and competitors we need to ensure that all involved in the sport are safe and respect the welfare of the horse at all times.

Stewards are responsible for ensuring the welfare of horses is upheld, that the rules for the event are adhered to and that events are conducted safely.

In this role they are expected to supervise training and warm-up areas, stables and other areas where horses are held, ridden or treated as well as the field of play for competitions.

What is Stewarding?

It is supervision at Dressage events by trained individuals to ensure:

- the welfare of the horse is paramount
- a level playing field is provided for all participating athletes
 Stewards play a vital role in ensuring the ongoing good reputation of our sport and safety of horses, competitors & the public

The purpose of Stewarding is:

- To protect the welfare of the horse and ensure fair play;
- To support the Organising Committee (OC) in the successful running of the event in line with the Current EA/FEI rules and regulations.
- To help and assist competiti in their endeavour to compete at their best in a safe and fair environment
- To ensure our good public image is upheld
- To supervise competition, training and warm-up areas, stables and other areas where horses are held.
- To assist competitors in meeting approved regulations for saddlery, bridles, bits, spurs & logos etc.

Stewards are not Policeman!

- They are there to help and assist competitors reach their goals

Prevention is always the better option!

- Stewards are there to prevent any situation that may develop which could be detrimental to competitors or the sport as a whole.

Stewards and other Officials are authorised to:

- Intervene in order to prevent any abuse of horses by riders, grooms, owners or any other person.
- Intervene in order to prevent any contravention of the common principles of behaviour, fairness and accepted standards of sportsmanship

K Gear Stewards are compulsory at all Dressage Events.

What events are Warm-up and Exercise arena Stewards required? Regular Club Events including Official & Competitive – Desirable Regional & Major Club Championships – Highly Desirable State Championships – Compulsory National Championships & CDI's – Compulsory



Riders must apply for this award using the appropriate form on the DQ website by 31st October. This application includes a statutory declaration.

SELECTORS' PANEL CHOICE TROPHIES

Dressage Queensland FEI Horse of the Year

- Open to Equestrian Queensland-registered combinations, having competed at FEI in the current year
- Focus placed upon Queensland representation at major interstate events and CDI results
- Open to Australian-based combinations only

ELD Junior Young Rider Trophy

- Open to junior young riders aged between 12-15yrs inclusive
- The winner will be selected from the highest ranked junior rider in each competition level (eg prelim, novice, elementary etc)

 - Independent (e.g. member of EQ board/OC member etc)

Individuals or Clubs/Organizing Committees must apply for this award using the appropriate form on the DQ website by 31st October.

Club of the Year Award

Award Criteria

- This award will go to the club who has demonstrated an ability to encourage growth and development of dressage in Queensland
- Open to all Equestrian Queensland-affiliated clubs running dressage events

Clubs must apply for this award using the appropriate form on the DQ website by 31st October.

Judge of the Year Award

This award recognizes the service that judges give to the sport.

Award Criteria

- F to C level judges with a minimum 3 years active experience
- Up to date with qualifications
- High availability to all Dressage competitions Club Days, Participant and Official
- Consistency and relevance of marks
- Service to self-development and/or development of further judges
- Shows a desire and willingness to increase skill base and knowledge
- Approachability and willingness to communicate with the DQJSC, fellow judges and riders for self-analysis
- Must not be a committee member of Dressage Queensland, DQJSC or EQ board
- The recipient will be decided upon by the DQJSC

Festival of Dressage Volunteer of the Year Award

Newly Classified Para Equestrian Tarsha Tupper—Grade 1a

Para Equestrian riders are classified into Grades. Those grades are: Grade 1a, Grade 1b, Grade 11, Grade 111 and Grade IV.

A person that is graded and classified as a Grade 1A para equestrian only has the ability to compete in a walk test and are mainly wheelchair users and may be able to walk with some assistance.



Tarsha's Story

Tarsha Tupper is seventeen years of age and started riding when she was 8 years old at the local Riding for Disabled Centre where she has ridden once a week since.

In 2011 an idea occurred to her that she would like to represent Australia at the 2016 Para Olympics in Rio in the Equestrian events. Her mother, father and younger sister are not "horsey" orientated, so how was this dream ever going to become a reality? As Christopher Reeve once said "At first dreams seem impossible, then improbable and eventually inevitable". And so the journey began.

I will be in your ear about this in the coming months – you won't be able to forget!

Reaccreditation—The reaccreditation period is now 1/4/12 to 31/3/15.

Seminars & Workshops - All Levels

As you are all very well aware to maintain our accreditation every 2 years we have to do the following – refer to rules 9.15.1 & 9.25:

- Attend and participate in an Education Seminar at your current judging level every two years.
- Attend a workshop in the alternate year

Judging Requirements

- A/B/C/D/E/F Judge at 4 events at your highest level i.e. 2 a year
- A/B/C/D/E/F Judge 2 other events at any level up to your highest level
- H Judge at 4 Participation/Restricted Club events at Preliminary/Novice level

Activity Points - All Levels - Earn at least 12 activity points over the 2 year period.

As the reaccreditation period, as a one off, has been extended by 12 months it will be necessary, in addition to the above, to undertake the following:

Important - Please note that you are not being asked to do anything extra. The additional judging etc is all what you would do normally in a year. The process is just being extended by a year (one off to change the cycle) so therefore it is necessary to do some pro rata judging.

Seminars & Workshops - All Levels

- Seminar process every 2 years has to continue so if you did a seminar in 2011 or 2012 you should have done another one in 2013 or 2014 (this year) and so it goes on.
- Workshop process on the alternate year has to continue as well.

Judging Requirements

- A/B/C/D/E/F Judging you need to judge at **two more additional events at your highest level** total judging to be at 6 events over the 3 years by 1/1/15
- A/B/C/D/E/F Judging you need to judge at one other event at any level total judging to be at 3 events over the 3 years by 1/1/15
- H you need to judge at **two more additional events** total judging to be at 6 events over the 3 year period by 1/1/15

Activity Points – All Levels - It has been agreed that the total activity points will remain at 12 over the 3 year period.

Welcome to Sheree Conroy from Warwick, Jodi Triggs from Darwin, Danila Lochrin from Darwin, and Andrea Williams from North Maclean, all new H level judges.

Congratulations to Emma Flegman and Connie Bookless who have been appointed Mentors. Also to Maria Schwennesen who has been added to the FEI Dressage Mentor list and has been invited to judge at the Western European League World Cup Qualifier, to be held in Gothenburg on February 15, 2015. Maria is also on the long list to judge at the Reem Acra FEI World Cup Final in Dressage, to be held in Las Vegas on April 15, 2015.

Paces—The paces mark (in the Collective Marks) is very much determined by the marks you have given throughout the test. Remember that the quality of the Paces is a direct result of how well the Training Scale has been developed within the particular horse. The Rhythm, Suppleness, Contact, Impulsion, Straightness and Collection determine the quality of the Paces (just another way to say it). Therefore if you have been giving 5-6 throughout the test, the mark for Paces is not likely to be an 8 (for example) – similarly it is not going to be a 3 or 4 either. In fact if you are considering a mark below 4 for Paces, the horse should probably have been belled out for unsoundness. Horses who show a clear 4 beat walk, two beat trot and three beat canter, have to be worth at least a 6 for paces. Any irregularities, unlevelness, unsoundness etc in any of the Paces has to be taken into consideration, both in the movement where it occured and in the Collective Marks if occurring most of the time. Sometimes, for whatever reason, a horse may show a few irregular steps within a movement. In this instance it is only the movement which is penalised. At times, if the situation requires it, we have to be "a little mean" in the Paces mark – we do have to consider the Welfare of the Horse after all. Consider the marks you have given during the test before allocating the Collective Mark for Paces.

Young Horse Judging—Some Comments to Use—For those of you who are Young Horse Judges, below is a useful list of comments you can use and add to your "toolbox" – compiled by Mary Seefried. Thank you Mary. Some of these comments could also be useful for non Young Horse tests.

TROT

- Elastic, Expressive
- Shows cadence
- Uses hind legs well
- Expressive mediums
- Could develop more uphill tendency
- Shows ability to expand outline
- More pushing than carrying
- Lacking thrust and suspension
- Flat strides
- Mediums show increased freedom
- Not able to maintain regularity
- Becoming hurried
- Losing balance
- Croup too high

WALK

- Covers ground—energetic, active
- Shows overstep and freedom of shoulder
- Uses body well—through the body
- Neck could stretch more downwards
- Tense—Relaxed
- Shows clear difference between the walks
- Rider should be able to take up the reins without stiffening the poll

CANTER

- Elastic, Expressive
- Uphill—needs more uphill tendency
- Uses hind legs well
- Well balanced
- Shows ability to expand the outline
- Needs more self-carriage
- Lacks elevation and freedom of the shoulders
- Light on the feet
- Effortless
- Needs more ground cover

Workbooks—We are no longer continuing to use the workbooks for the levels E to A. Workbooks will still be used for H and F. These will be reviewed and a new version available soon.

Toe Stoppers—The ADC has made the decision to allow Toe Stoppers – however any tie downs or tying the stirrup leather to the girth is strictly forbidden.

Directives for Assessing the Degree of Difficulty in a Freestyle Test

For those of you like me, who cringe every time I am asked to judge a freestyle and frantically devour any information I have to hand, maybe the following will help. This is taken from the FEI website.

1. Initial Comments

The assessment of the degree of difficulty in a Freestyle test cannot be made separately from the other technical and artistic scores. There is a close connection between the degree of difficulty and the technical execution. Lack of quality in the execution of the movement is considered a deficit in the performance ability of rider and/or horse. These must be taken into consideration as deductions in the degree of difficulty scoring.

The **basic requirements** of the Freestyle are achieved when the rider shows all compulsory movements listed in the test sheets for each level. The rider can increase the degree of difficulty and raise the score for his performance (when executed with technical correctness) by:

- Appropriate repetition of single exercises, especially the exercises with a coefficient.
- Exceeding the minimum requirements of the exercises, such as number of simple and flying tempi changes or piaffe steps, but without exaggeration.
- Showing a steeper angle than requested in half passes possibly combined with changes of direction.
- Executing the movements on lines without the support of arena rails, such as on the inner track, the quarter or centre line, or on angled or curved lines, (e.g. circle or serpentine).
- Well-chosen placing of movements in positions that make their execution more difficult: for example directly in front of the arena rails, as well as pirouettes directed outwards, possibly towards the spectators.
- Well-presented clearly defined combinations of movements (e.g. half-passes in trot followed by half-passes
 in passage, flying changes every second stride immediately followed by changes every stride and vice versa).
- Showing demanding and difficult transitions (e.g. piaffe or passage derived from the halt without prior development of impulsion; transition from walk or halt directly into a series of flying changes; significant but still harmonious transitions out of an extended pace to a highly collected exercise: e.g. extended trot to piaffe or extended canter to (half) canter pirouette or piaffe.
- Performing movements or transitions with the reins in one hand but without exaggeration.


A **well-calculated** risk is demonstrated when the Degree of Difficulty corresponds to the potential and the level of training of rider and horse. A challenging, technically correct performance is a significant testimony of a high standard of riding ability and the training of the horse. On the other hand, obvious mistakes in the execution of the movements may reflect an over-asking by the rider of the horse, which means a badly calculated risk, and the score for the Degree of Difficulty has to be reduced. If the classical dressage cannot be presented as stated in the rules, it is absolutely necessary to react by reducing the mark for the Degree of Difficulty.

2. Guidelines for Scoring

With special attention to the initial comments and the clarifications in the Guidelines for Judges, the recommended directives for points awarded for degree of difficulty are as follows:

- When only the minimum requirements for the basis level are fulfilled, approximately 6.0.
- When there is a rise in the degree of difficulty according to the level of the respective standard tests minimum of 7.0.
- For each movement with increased degree of difficulty (calculated risk) the score should rise accordingly.

Additional Piaffe pirouettes and passage half passes are not considered as a higher degree of difficulty, although they are to be rated positively in the choreography.



Judges Box—We must reward good basic work, especially in the lower levels. We should not be too tough when judging Preliminary and Novice level classes. The higher levels—Elementary and upwards—where collection and lateral work come into play, will soon sort them out.

Apart from a little lengthening and leg yielding, there is nothing much in the lower level tests. Provided a horse is working over his hindquarters, is able to maintain a steady connection and demonstrates accurate figures, and works with calmness and harmony, why not a 7 or an 8 (actually the above sounds more like an 8 than a 7). Horses working well at these levels should be getting at least 70%.

We have to send the correct message to the riders. We need to look for what went right—not what went wrong! Remember to think about the level you are judging, i.e. set in your mind the criteria for that particular level, and don't be too "picky", especially in the lower levels.

Judges need to keep to the timed draw (if at all possible). Sometimes (through no fault of our own) we get a bit behind timewise. If this happens there is always the opportunity to catch up during the breaks. If you are behind time, please **DO NOT** insist on taking your scheduled break. It is our duty to the riders to work through and try to catch up. We can always have a cuppa and a bite to eat while judging – we are multi skilled! It is also a good idea to get the OC to announce that you are ???minutes behind schedule – this is only fair on the riders. Riders time their warm up to best suit their horse – to be forced to wait an extra 10 mins (for example) is unfair on them. We are the riders friend (or should be) so let's help them all we can.

The other point I want to discuss is **comments.** Novice level tests do not include collection, so no reference should be made to it in your comments. Balance, engagement, self carriage etc are all appropriate to talk about, but not collection. Collection is not mentioned in any test until Elementary level, and then only briefly – and the general opinion is that if the horse can perform the movements with ease and fluency then it has enough collection. In fact I would go as far as to say that it is probably a good idea to not even mention collection – instead comment on the "things" that create or inhibit collection. Real collection is usually only seen in the top FEI levels (as I remember Eric Lette saying years ago).

To quote Helen Langehanenberg (an article in the June issue of Horse Deals)

"Collection is not riding slowly, collection is more engagement from the hind leg. Collection is more carrying in the back. Collection is more freedom in the front legs and collection is a more uphill position" – exactly what the Rule Book says, just expressed a little differently.

Something to note – lunging in a double bridle is not permitted. Refer to the rule book for clarification. A horse was seen lunging in a double bridle at a recent event. The welfare of the horse is paramount, and if you see this happening do something about it. Perhaps the lunger was unaware of this rule, but it does have to be pointed out to them.

If you are bringing your own writer to an event you should let the OC know in advance. It is a common courtesy. Some volunteer has gone to a lot of trouble to source enough writers, and for a writer to turn up (often early in the morning) and be told they are not needed could well put them off from ever volunteering again. It would certainly put me off!! Please check that you have the correct test sheets to judge from (this especially applies to our A and B level Judges). The FEI tests change from time to time and it is very easy for the OC to sometimes inadvertently print off the wrong sheets. It can develop into quite a stressful situation for all involved – so please check that the sheets are correct. A good idea to maybe ensure that you always have your own (correct) copies on hand.

When changing from one class to another, please check that your writer is using the correct test sheets. I'm sure we've all been guilty of being caught judging one test and finding out our writer is using an incorrect test sheet – I know I have been. It is easily done – just one more thing we have to be aware of when judging (it's a wonder we ever survive!)

Shadow Judging—please do not turn up at an event and expect the OC to provide you with a writer, test sheets etc. It is just not on. Firstly you must contact the OC in advance and request to do some shadow judging – then you must contact the Judge involved and seek their approval. You must supply your own test sheets, writer, car etc and when completed add up your test sheets and work out your placings etc. I know it sounds like a lot of work, but OC are usually stressed enough on the day of an event, and it is not their responsibility to "look after you".

Insurance Cover for Judges when Officiating at an Event—Some concerns have been raised regarding insurance cover for judges when officiating at events. The following information has been provided to the ADJC by EA CEO Grand Baldock.

"If an official is acting on behalf of an EA insured club or event or if they are engaged in non-income earning activities then the EA member insurance will cover them and they do not require the additional top up insurance. A list of current clubs and events that hold EA insurance is available on the EA website

http://www.equestrian.org.au/site/equestrian/national/downloads/insurance/List%20of20insured%20clubs% 20for%website.pdf

The interpretation of income earning has not changed with the new policy. If an official is receiving payment above reimbursement expenses whilst not acting on behalf of an EA insured entity, then they have never been covered under the EA insurance policy. We have now offered these officials the benefit of access to a top up cover at a very reasonable premium.

Officials are not required to take out this top up insurance, it is an added benefit that EA is providing to their members.

Officials who are judging at clubs or events covered under the EA insurance scheme are covered under the club or events insurance. If an official is acting outside of these environments and earning an income (i.e. getting paid an hourly rate) they will not be covered by the EA member's insurance policy and we would advise them to take out the new top up insurance.

With regards to the conduct of seminars, marking exams etc officials would be covered on behalf of the underlying body. For example if a judge educator is completing an assessment on behalf of EA then EA's insurance would cover them."

The above advice is general in nature and does not outline every specific clause of the EA National Insurance Programme and how it applies to you. This advice should be read in conjunction with the terms and conditions of the policy contained in the full policy wording available from Gow-Gates Insurance Brokers.

I trust the above clarifies the situation for all judges and would recommend all judges to check their insurance cover when judging non EA events. Please be aware that in some states, but not all, some Pony Clubs are affiliated with EA and are therefore covered under the EA insurance. Judges are advised to check carefully the situation in relation to Pony Club affiliation with EA in their state.

Judges Profiles:

Liz Owens

Although born in Queensland, I grew up in WA and started competing there when I was 14 after I had saved up the required \$125 which was my half of my first horse. I was at Darling Range Pony Club with Clayton Fredericks and probably started judging there. My coach at the time was Nadine Merewether and she was an stickler for detail – she had and probably still has, a remarkable library of horse books and would allow me to read them when I babysat her daughter in exchange for lessons. Nadine made sure you could write your own test and her pupils

judged each other in mock competitions. Nadine and my father, with others, started the Dressage Club of WA and it was through the club that I began judging officially, starting in 1979. During one University break I went to the UK and did my British coaching qualifications with Christopher Bartle. The British Horse Society was also pretty pedantic about the training scale, school figures and accuracy, so everything Nadine had taught me was reinforced. Another great mentor during this time was Wanda Nelson who ensured I knew the rules and encouraged me to attend all the seminars I could. I also attended clinics with Wolfgang Niggli and Domini Morgan when they came to WA.

After 10 years judging in WA up to Elementary level I moved to Sydney for work and continued judging and attending coaching seminars there. From there I moved to Europe for my husband's work and trained with Gyula Dallos, a Hungarian rider awarded 4th in the World Cup during the years I was in Budapest. I didn't do any judging in that time but I did get to attend a number of international and local events. I was told if you want to win in dressage in Hungary, you have to pay the judge and your mother has to sleep with him (or visa versa)!

After 2 years in Hungary we returned to Australia, to Qld this time, and I began judging again with guidance from Mary Seefried and Irene Bakels-Noreen. A move to Melbourne saw me train with Rudolph Zeilinger, Harry Bolt, Glen Fryer, Richard Weiss and occasionally with Clemens Dierks while pursuing an upgrade to Medium/Advanced level judge. In 2000 my daughter was born with some special needs that demanded quite a bit of time so I stopped judging until 2010. By then I was back in Qld and training with Irene Bakels-Noreen again who convinced me I needed to get re-accredited through the fast track programme having trained a couple of horses to FEI and one to Grand Prix. I do hope to get to "A" level but have taken a break from upgrading this year so I can concentrate on WEG and my Chef's role for that event.

Max and Judy Herschell

I (Max) was born in Mitchell, and brought up in the little town of Prairie east of Hughenden. I trained as a Butcher Slaughterman and small goods maker. Became a Shearer [gun shearer] which is over 200 a day, and also did contract mustering and droving. My horse riding as a young man was camp drafting. I went to hospital in Blackall with appendix problems and met this young red haired nurse, who stopped me in my tracks.

Judy and I were married in 1965, after which I managed several station properties. We moved to Brisbane in 1970. We were in Darra when the floods hit in 1974, but luckily we were high and dry.

I like to think I have too much to learn to be the holder of much wisdom, but for me the sport of dressage has never been about anything other than harmony between horse and rider, purity of paces, suppleness and systematic training. My greatest thrill as a rider is when I get that youngster I bought as an unbroken/just broken youngster down the centre line in their first event and as a judge it is finding my co-judge is a kindred spirit and we are rewarding the same things.

Judy was born in Brisbane but moved to Blackall when she was 3 as her Mum had bad Asthma. Her Dad, Len Cowan managed many stations. Judy nursed at Blackall hospital as well as helping her dad with the running of the stations. Up at 2am mustering sheep for shearing. That's when you get "prickly" horses. Most mornings were well below 2deg in winter.

We came to Caboolture and raised 3 wonderful children. We now have 7 grandchildren and 2 great grandchildren. Judy went to work at Pallano Stud with Neridah Bayard - that's when we got into Dressage. My equestrian interests started later in life than most, as I was a "town girl" being involved in normal sports such as swimming, basketball, waterskiing and sailing. When I returned to my home town of Ayr (North Queensland) as a secondary school teacher, I met my future husband who owned a sugar cane farm and cattle property close to Ayr.

On weekends, it was mustering time and I was faced with the dilemma of learning to ride so I could go too, or staying at home and making the sandwiches. Well, it was a "no-brainer" so off I went to start my equestrian experience. There was no such thing as "the Training Scale" - it was a matter of still being in the saddle at the end of the day! From there, I became a senior pony clubber then on to several years following the local shows with hacks and showjumpers.

Dressage was just emerging at this time in North Queensland and I developed an interest in it immediately and am still actively competing in events up this way. I enjoy the discipline as it fitted into our lifestyle and it was always a personal challenge - "to do better next time". I have been fortunate to have several "handy" horses and managed to take a couple to Advanced. I am involved with the North Queensland Equestrian Group based in Townsville which caters for dressage and showjumping. I was active in the committee holding various positions for lots of years and was honoured to receive Life Membership. I have since retired from the committee but still do "my bit" organising some competitions and the funding applications.

In 2006, my husband was diagnosed with pancreatic cancer and after an enormous battle, passed away in November 2007 - my horse and horse friends were a great support for me during this time and let me "get away" from reality for a while. My son and I took over the running of the farm and property – and a helicopter business which we started in 1999 – and our new way of life settled down. Not for long - as my body decided that it was going to "pack it in" and over the next two years, I had a full knee replacement and a hip replacement - lots of rehab. However, it was all worthwhile as I am now back riding competitively and still enjoying the challenge.

My judging started when there was a drastic need for judges in the North and I have progressed to D level. I feel that "being on the other side of the windscreen" has been a fantastic benefit to my competition riding. I would like to further my judging accreditation but there is very little need for C and B level judges in the north. I enjoy travelling to Nationals and CDIs to keep in touch with the top levels. My biggest achievement in my judging career was to receive the "2011 Queensland Dressage Judge of the Year", which was very humbling. It was a result of lots of judging and organising lots of Judges' clinics, workshops and seminars in the Townsville area over the years. There are now ten official local judges available to the clubs for their events.

Even though my time as a competitive rider probably has an "expiry date" in the foreseeable future, I want to continue with my judging untilas long as possible.

Lesley Sullivan

Personal—I lived in Darwin from 1963 to 2004. Originally went to Darwin in my early teens when my father who was in the RAAF was posted there. Darwin was a great life. We managed to survive Cyclone Tracy on Xmas Eve 1974. We lost our house which was only insured for what we owed on it and our contents were not insured at all so we had to start all over again. We did and moved onto our 5 acre block in April 1976. It was great to be able to have the horses in the back yard so to speak and a sand dressage arena under lights.

During my time in Darwin I worked for the Northern Territory Public Service (NTPS) for 41 years in the area of Human Resources (HR). At the time of my retirement in June 2004 I was the Director of HR Services and had the responsibility of Payroll (paid 15000 public servants every fortnight), Recruitment, Workers Compensation and OH&S. It was a fabulous job, very busy and full on but one that I thoroughly enjoyed.

'Sully' was a Ranger with the NTPS from 1964 to 1999 and he had a very interesting life in feral animal control shooting buffalo, horses, donkeys etc from helicopters, dingo baiting and crocodile catching.

In October 2004 we moved to Tweed Heads South in northern NSW. The move has been the best thing. We just love it here.

Competition—I started competing in Darwin in 1969 and my first event was the Katherine Show. Over the years I competed successfully in led, rider and hack classes. In 1967 Dressage was introduced to the NT and I was a founding member of the Darwin Dressage Club of which I am now a Life Member. I represented the NT on two occasions at the National Dressage Championships in 1984 (WA) and 1987 (QLD). I competed successfully up to and including Advanced/PSG. My Coach and Mentor for many, many years was the late Jim O'Farrell who I used to get to Darwin several times a year.

In 1989 I won the NT Horse of the Year on a horse called Peace Agent that I purchased from Di Jenkyn in 1987. I started making noises about competing in the National HOTY event in Victoria in December of that year. At that time my husband had been resisting my urging to go the 1st World Equestrian Games in Sweden. However, after me talking about competing at the National HOTY he piped up and said 'I'm not taking you all the way to Werribee to compete for 3 minutes and not win. I'll take you to WEG instead.' Of course I was delighted with this and off we went to Sweden. We have been to every WEG since except the 2nd one in The Hague in 1994.

Judging—I began judging unofficially in 1976 and became an accredited judge in 1985 at Novice level. In the NT we could only accredit up to and including Elementary as that was highest level of competition in those days. To upgrade to Medium, Advanced, B and A level it was necessary to travel interstate to do all shadow judging, theory exams and practical exams. Thanks to my mentor the late Judy Cubitt who provided accommodation and transport and lots of words of wisdom which I can still hear today.

EFA/EA Involvement—In the early days the Darwin equestrian community was under the umbrella of the Darwin & District Equestrian Association. I was instrumental in the formation of the EFA NT Branch in 1984 and was involved heavily in the EFA NT Branch from inception to 2004 and during this time held many positions including being Chair/Vice Chair for 11 years. I was given Life Membership to the Branch in 2004. I was a National EA Board Member from 1995 to 2003.

My Dressage EA involvement includes some 18 years at a national level involved with the NDC/ADC. I was Chair of the Australian Dressage C'tee (ADC) from April 2007 to December 2012. I have been 'the keeper of the Dressage rule book' since 1992 and continue to do so.

I have been heavily involved with the Australian Dressage Judges Committee (ADJC) since 2003 to present and as a member I also carry out the Secretarial role. Lately I have been busy working with Mary Seefried to finalise Power Point Presentations for the various judge education seminars and workshops. These PP Presentations are a national resource and all JEs will be using them across the country so we are all 'singing from the same hymn book' and all judges are getting the same information. A huge job finished, just have to keep them current and review them on an annual basis.

QLD Involvement—Since arriving in QLD (and I might add being made very welcome) in late 2004 I have been heavily involved with the DQ Judges Sub Committee from 2005. I was Chair from Jan 2009 to Feb 2013. I was a Selector from 2010 to Jan 2013. My current role is as the H level Co-ordinator 'looking after' our aspiring dressage judges. I also maintain the records of judges for reaccreditation purposes, look after the judges list etc. etc. I was appointed as a Mentor in 2005 and a Judge Educator in 2010 and thoroughly enjoy this side of Dressage. I perform the role of TD at many events in QLD and this is a role that I also enjoy very much.

Officiating—As a Dressage judge I have judged at dressage events in all Australian states and in Malaysia and NZ. I was also on the judging panel for the National Show Horse Championships and the QLD Horse of the Year in 1996. As a TD I have carried out this role at the Australian Dressage Championships, the Dressage Festival and many events in QLD. I am also an FEI Level 2 Steward and this year will be the FEI Steward at the Australian Dressage C'Ships for the CDI competitions.

General—In our spare times my hubby 'Sully' and I manage to do a fair bit of travelling. This year we will once again go to the World Equestrian Games and this will be followed by a couple of river cruises in France. That's what you can do when you are retired. Life is good.

Over the years I have made some wonderful friends in the dressage fraternity – judges, riders, owners. The Education system that we have in place is robust and we are getting some very good knowledgeable judges through the system as a result. Whilst some might think that there is too much to do once they have completed the process and upgraded to the next level time and time again judges are saying that they were very well prepared for the exam process as a result of pre regs that they had to do.

All I can say to aspiring judges is keep going – you will enjoy the journey and at the end of the day you will enjoy your judging and be part of a great community of dressage judges.

Lea Bierman

I wasn't lucky enough to be born into a horsey family. The first time I ever sat on a horse was when I was twelve although I had already realised I loved them, written a book on how to ride them when I was seven and arranged a job picking up poo at a riding school so I could be near them. From the very first time I experienced dressage at the Wynnum Pony Club I was completely hooked. I rode my first test on a show jumper called Hanover and my first comp was the State Championships held at the Brookfield Showgrounds. I was 17. It was on that day that I decided I was going to become a Grand Prix rider, a Grand Prix coach and a Grand Prix judge. Amazingly I managed to do it.

I've been judging now for over 30 years in Australia and overseas at all levels and still I'm never completely satisfied that I get it all right. I see judging as a heavy responsibility. Judges give feedback on training and direction and rank one rider's performance against another. Major tasks. After all this there is only ever one person who thinks you got it right- the winner! It can be a thankless task but someone has to do it or we don't have a sport. I have always been attracted to the technical side of training and judging. Dressage has fascinating science behind it and all judges should understand where the movements come from and their purpose as well as how they should appear in a test.

For fourteen years I lectured at UQG in the Equine Studies programme. While there I completed my Post Graduate Research Masters Degree in Education. In my thesis I examined the nature of equestrian knowledge and its relevance to education. Among other things I looked at the unique nature of equestrianism (e.g. our "sports equipment" is capable of independent thought and action and, in our comps, all ages and sexes and often experience levels can compete in the same class), its structure and how a tool (the schoolmaster horse) can teach its user. All of these aspects of our sport, I feel, affect how it is judged. Because I have ridden and trained all the movements I judge I can genuinely appreciate how difficult they are to install and perform but as a judge I have to put these emotions aside and just assess the performance before me. Not always easy.

One aspect of judging I really enjoy is mentoring up and coming judges. It is wonderful to be able to set someone on the path I have enjoyed so much. Every time I am involved with judge education I find I too learn something. Judging is just one of many ways I can put something back into the sport I love so much.

I truly feel that all FEI riders should be "acceleratedly" accredited to become Novice level judges so that their riding and training experience can be fed back into the system. This could be a real asset to our sport in this country. As usual I have become a "little" sidetracked!

Back to the profile. I've had 19 different competition dressage horses over my career. I trained twelve of those right through from Preliminary to FEI and four to Grand Prix. I've worked with Stockhorses, Arabians, Cleveland Bays, Australian Warmbloods, Andalusians, Holsteiners and Hanoverians. Probably my most successful horse was Cadenza. I bought her as a newly broken three year old and sold her as a Grand Prix horse. Her new owner ,Emma Flegman, continued her excellent career on to selection onto the National Talent Squad. She taught her young son to ride on her when the mare was 19 and cared for her until her death. What better life could I have asked for?



My current two competition horses are Wolkensomm (Molly) who is with Emma Flavelle and Jaydee Pardon (Gem) who patiently carries me around. It is my goal to take her through to Grand Prix next year health permitting.

Finally I'd like to conclude this "profile" by saying what always amazes me is not what I have done for dressage but what dressage has done for me. :)

Judy Sheldrake

I grew up in England in a farming area and was lucky my parents were supportive and I was able to start riding at a relatively early age, mainly in a recreation capacity but also helping a friend break in two delightful Dartmoor ponies. I travelled to Australia with my first husband (who had to sell his lovely horse to come here). For two years I was not able to ride much just on a station we worked on for a few weeks.

Two years later we moved to Darwin and a friend and myself found the local Riding School (a story in itself), Nicki and I used to ride all the difficult and newly "broken" horses. Not too long after this my husband bought me a horse for my twenty first birthday, a horse off the track, he was a "one owner" horse and loved me as much as I loved him. After he died I spent quite some time trying to find another horse, a friend offered to lease me her horse for twelve months. I declined as I felt I would become too fond of him and not want to give him back.

That event resulted in me being given another horse off the track what a difference, he could get me off his back whenever he chose. A friend suggested I should attend a dressage clinic with Tina Wormelsdorf, an instructor visiting from Sydney - I signed up. Prior to the clinic Missionary (said horse) got caught in a fence (we were living at this time on a massive cattle station), he cut two arteries and was to be out of work for a long time. Tina must have shuddered to have me in the clinic, I had been lent the "Clerk of the Course" horse for the clinic. Working in those days in a 40 X 20 arena was a challenge; however that was it, I was "hooked" and am still to this day.

In 1978 we relocated to Humpty Doo which put me in the "Hub" of the equestrian scene and I began my association with the Darwin Dressage Club. In 1979 I joined the committee as Secretary or Treasurer not sure which came first and for the following 30 plus years all but two have been a member of the executive committee as President, Vice President and the last three years Treasurer.

I was a member of the "Steering Committee" involved in the Northern Territory becoming a State branch of the Equestrian Federation of Australia and have for all but a couple of years again been a Board member including Chairman and for the last few years Vice Chairman. Also representing dressage as the NT Dressage Delegate travelling interstate to meetings etc.

My career over the last 35 years has been interesting and challenging, I commenced working with Telstra in 1979 as a casual worker to feed mine and my daughter's horse habits and ambitions. I have two daughters and one son (not interested in horses). The casual work became permanent for twenty years.

At the conclusion of my Telstra career my second husband, Peter and myself ventured into a Saddlery Feed shed business. A huge venture for a couple inexperienced at that time in retail. We continued in this business for five years before deciding it would be best to sell and move on. I then with the retail expertise gained from our business successfully won a position managing the new R.M. Williams store opening in the Darwin Mall. I had found my niche career wise and grew the business enormously with a passion not as great as horses, and loved what I was doing. My last two years career wise was managing a Salvos Store, again I found a new "passion" and learnt heaps, which has had quite an impact on myself and my life.

Back to the Horse part of my life - writing for judges gave me a desire to learn and also become a judge, I successfully passed Novice and the Elementary level in Darwin and then travelled to NSW and with the support of Joy Charlton and Judy Cubitt successfully went through the next three levels achieving my "A" Level Accreditation in 1996 after many trips interstate. I have also been involved with the Pony Club movement, being an NT Chief Instructor for a few years travelling to other Territory centres to assist other Pony Clubs and riders.

I have competed over the years, in Hacking (I didn't have the confirmation for this). I competed in dressage throughout this time with my last competition being two years ago. I trained and competed on six horses the most successful being Tadorna Astaire on who I competed at Prix St Georges. I was lucky enough in 1984 and 1987 to travel to WA and QLD to compete at the National Dressage Championships, not successfully but a fantastic experience.

I still have a warmblood mare I purchased from QLD and have now returned her to her home state. I am not sure we will venture into any more competitions however I can't imagine life without a horse and see me still feeding a horse forever even if I have to use my "walking frame" to do so.

Added to the above I have two beautiful granddaughters who I have helped train over the years, they now compete successfully in both dressage and show jumping.

Mid June Peter and I sold our Humpty Doo property and have moved to Queensland purchasing a property 52 kilometres west of Toowoomba, not quite where we had planned to live, it was meant to be the Sunshine Coast, but apart from the cold and difficulties with the internet it is just fantastic and so beautiful.

It was very sad to leave family and friends and I was humbled by the treatment bestowed on me by the clubs I had been involved with. I had been a Life Member of the Darwin Dressage Club and the Noonamah Horse and Pony Club for lots of years but was very honoured at a farewell function being given Life Membership to Equestrian Northern Territory.

I now look forward to the next phase in my life and continuing my "passion" in Queensland and look forward to an involvement with lots of judging and hopefully being able to help others who share the same obsession/passion wherever and however I possibly can.

I hope my "story" will encourage aspiring judges to continue on their path to become dressage judges and they will enjoy it as much as I do.

Tell us about your horse

Remi London Belle is a 16.2hh Hanoverian mare by the German stallion Londonderry and out of a Graf Landau mare. She carries the prefixes Perf. and EM. before her name with the Hanoverian Horse Society. Perf. is short for Performance and was awarded to her by the Society to acknowledge her dressage performances and EM is to denote that she is an Elite Mare in the Stud book – the highest classification a mare can have. Her stable name is "Pippi" after the storybook character Pippi Longstocking. I think you can work out why from her markings!

When did you get her?

We purchased her from her breeder, Cheryl O'Brien, of Remi Stud in 2008. I was initially not so keen! Despite her movie star looks, I was after something more educated as a schoolmaster for myself and Pippi had only trained and competed up to Elementary. However, my husband was determined that we purchase her and use her as a dual competition horse for me and broodmare via embryo transfer for our stud. I'm glad I listened to him as I can't imagine not having Pippi in my life. While I continued to get back into my riding Pippi was brought on and did a handful of advanced starts before I took over the ride.

Describe your typical day

First thing is a coffee while I check and answer any urgent emails, update Facebook, etc., for Dressage Qld, as I am currently the Secretary of both DQ and the DQ Riders' Sub-Committee. I then head out to feed the stud horses before going back inside for breakfast. Depending on which days there might be the farrier or vet visiting either our stud or Pippi to fit in. After breakfast I will head over to Davrol Warmbloods where Pippi lives and ride her. This takes up a few hours of my day by the time Pippi has her after-ride massage, I muck out her paddock and stable, get her some lunch and clean down my gear, etc. Sometimes it varies a little. Afternoons may be errands in town or back home to the computer to do more work for DQ. My husband is a contractor so I look after the office side of things for him as well.

Your achievements to date?

Competing FEI at PSG. This was a first for both Pippi and myself and I'm thrilled we did it together, and, of course, winning the Dressage Qld Ricky MacMillan Emerging FEI Rider Award for 2013. This award means so much to me as I was long ago inspired by Ricky and Crisp and their achievements.

What are your goals?

To keep learning as much as I can and see where the journey takes me. In particular, I want Pippi to be happy, healthy. and confident with her work and me. A little bit higher up the FEI ladder would be nice but we'll see. At this point I really want to say a huge thank you to my husband for his endless support and encouragement, to everyone at Davrol for looking after Pippi like one of their own, my coach Jenny Gehrke and my wonderful sponsors Cal Rei Australia and New Zealand.

Any tips for others in similar situations?

Enjoy it, work hard and give it a go! Also, whether you are training at home or out competing, if something goes wrong – it's been, done and gone – it's history. You can't go back and change history so move on. don't ride reactively to fix something that's already happened. Ride positively to make the next movement or exercise count.



Summary of Business of the meeting of the Australian Dressage Committee Sunday 30 May 2014

Dressage Strategic Planning Taskforce/Rider - Club

Survey—The Chair reports that the second meeting of this Taskforce held the day after the May ADC meeting had made progress with ideas about "Marquee events" to promote the sport of dressage at multidiscipline events. The EA Board has also picked up this concept and will put resources into it developing a Manual to assist OCs of major events.

Thank you to all who responded to the Rider/Club Survey – the ADC has looked briefly at the results but now needs to analyse all of the valuable information that has been provided. There is no doubt that this analysis will inform the Dressage Strategic Taskforce as well as have an impact on the agenda of the ADC in 2015.

Pacific League Final 2015/16—The meeting made a decision on the venue for the League Final for both 205/16 and 2016/17 season. It has been sent to the Board for approval.

High Performance Report—Chris Webb (HP Manager) and Julia Battams (NPD) gave a report on WEG 2014 preparations for both Dressage and PE Teams.

Chris Webb also outlined a draft of the **High Performance Plan** (General and Discipline Specific) for the next 4 year period which will be finalised by end of 2014.

The **YH** selection process for the FEI World Young Horse Championships was raised and agreed to review the policy schedule of timeframes to better incorporate European based young horses in terms of their qualification process.

The desired PE competition program for the future was also raised and it is proposed that at least every second year, Australia would conduct an international CPDI. This would provide judge and steward opportunities in AUS and NZ.

Para Equestrian Report—Sue Cunningham provided a detailed report from the FEI Para-Equestrian Technical Committee Meeting, of which she is a member, held in Mannheim, Germany on the 1st - 2nd May 2015. Education Calendar should be available by the 1st October

2014. There should be at least one exam and one refresher seminar offered to FEI PED judges every year.

In 2015 Para forum to discuss major rule changes planned for 2017. The hosting NF is still to be named.

Additional EA PE tests are still under consideration.

NEM Report—National Education Manager Ben Harris, gave a report on the FEI courses conducted in each discipline, including courses for stewards. He also confirmed that all national reaccreditation processes to remain on 2 year cycle, but for office efficiency will synchronise all officials in all disciplines as from 31.3.15.

Also discussed that at last ADJC. JE/Mentors National meeting it was agreed to develop a National Calendar of Judge educational activities so that cooperation between states can develop and candidates can see where courses are available throughout Australia (if they have missed one in their own state.) This is being coordinated by the ADJC and is already available to each State Judge Coordinator/Committee. It will ultimately be available on the EA website.

Young Horse Rules— The TD report for the March Australian Young Dressage Horse Championships (DJWTS) led to discussion about the 6YO Pony Test—this is still too difficult so a revised easier version will be developed for the season starting on 1 August 2014. In addition the Judge requirements for the Pony Classes were reviewed in order to give more opportunities to Australian accredited YH judges.

NB. The revised Rules for 1 August 2014 season have been sent to all State Dressage Authorities and the 6YO Pony test has been finalised and is on website.

EA Membership Review Outcomes—As yet the EA Board has not finalised the outcomes of the Review.

National Amateur Owner/Rider Division—This has been very successfully (and enthusiastically) taken up in NSW and Queensland. Other states will have

an opportunity to provide further feedback at ADC/ SDA meeting in September.

Stewards – Fact Sheet on Role of Stewards — On the basis of the paper prepared with assistance of the FEI Steward-General, ADC agreed to update the Rule Book with more explanation on the role of stewards and also to prepare a Stewards Fact Sheet to be available to riders and OCs. This could also be promulgated at National and State Squad Clinics.

Dogs at Events—As accidents have occurred where dogs are present and especially difficult situations could arise where we have able- bodied and PE riders in same areas, ADC recommends the following: All dogs should be restrained at all times. Dogs should not be permitted in field of play and practice/warm-up arenas. All riders, owners and officials are asked to keep dogs out of stabling and other horse areas and to ensure that their friends, family and clients also follow this directive.

Hot weather dress—The ADC agreed to the recommendation for relaxed styles for shirts to be worn if a coat is removed for reason of hot weather. The changes will be reflected in the 2015 Rule book changes.

National Dressage Performance Gold Medals—

Information regarding these has gone up on the EA website. Qualifying period is 11/9/13 to 10/9/14

Market Research Project—Kerry Mack of ADC proposed that a Market research survey be carried out in order to determine what EA members can offer prospective sponsors. Kerry highlighted the need for Dressage events to become more financially self-sufficient and the need to attract more sponsors from outside the sport. NB This project has, since May, been developed to final stages with a draft survey already tested and sent to the EA Board for approval and delivery. It ties in well with the Marquee events topic under discussion both by Dressage Strategic Taskforce and the EA Board.

Live streaming Update—ADC noted that many major shows are picking up the concept of the live streaming. Reports have been provided on coverage and usage by some streaming providers—would be

useful to get more specific information on where actual users come from – i.e. within 1 hours drive of the venue as there is some concern that live streaming takes away from ticket sales and live audience. If anyone has further advice please let the Chair ADC know.

Time between Rides—At some venues with large distances between stables, warm-up and competition arenas, the FEI recommendation of 60 minutes between rides by same rider is too tight. The ADC strongly recommends that OCs push this out to 90 minutes. Same goes for draws for riders with multiple rides at national competitions at such venues.

Ideas for Team Championship Events and "Novelty" Classes.

The ADC is seeking to explore and promote ideas which add interest to the sport for riders at all levels, but in particular the non-professional segment. The recent Amateur Owner Category is an example of this type of initiative. ADC is also interested in promoting team competition at all levels in order to build a culture of participating in teams as Dressage is generally an individual pursuit.

To this end, ADC is developing a Fact Sheet on Team competitions following the example of the very successful Inter-Club Team Championship conducted in Victoria. A Fact Sheet will also be developed on other "new" ideas for classes. We are interested in hearing of any successful ideas.

Horses and Dreams meets Australia - Hagen, Germany, 22-26 April 2015—Every year, the Hagen international dressage show chooses a country to be the theme of the show. In 2015 it is Australia, and the ADC discussed ideas which could assist the success of the show.

Terms of Office – 3 positions vacant at end of 2014

Mary Seefried, Sue Cunningham and Kerry Mack have finished their first two year terms on ADC and are eligible for re-election. In addition Liz Owens will finish her term as Riders Rep in October and a new rider's representative rep will elected at the Nationals. Nominations forms will be available in early October.

Dressage Rules

The most important rule is for you to know the rules under which you compete. All competitors should have the current rule book. Why not download it to your phone or iPad? That way you always have it with you for quick reference. It can be downloaded from here - http://www.equestrian.org.au/dressage-rules

There have been many changes to the rules and one of the important ones is that rather than eliminate riders for a misdemeanour penalties have now been applied. I might add not in all instances but in a lot of instances e.g. if you present with some incorrect clothing it is now a penalty of minus 2 from each judge. However, why would you want to just throw away precious marks through carelessness? If it was me I would be making sure all my gear was spot on with the rules.

Equipment in General – The ADC (Australian Dressage Committee) is always getting queries about the legality of various pieces of equipment – spurs, bits, lunging gear, saddles, stirrups etc. An 'Equipment Page' has been set up on the EA website – www.equestrian.org.au click on sport/dressage/rules & regs/equipment – and you will see what has been approved and what hasn't. If you are in doubt as to the legality of a piece of equipment that you would like to use then please refer your query and a photo of the piece of equipment to Mary Seefried, Chair ADC at mary.seefried@gmail.com

Bridle Numbers - Rule 1.15.8



- Two numbers must be worn one on either side of the horse
- The numbers may be worn on the side of bridle or on the saddle cloth. If the numbers are attached to the saddle cloth make sure that they are secure.



- The numbers must be clearly visible
- Whenever the horse is out of the stable both numbers must be worn for identification purposes this includes being ridden, lunged, walked, grass feeding etc

Coats - Rule 2.7

One thing that I have noticed recently is when riders decide **not** to wear a coat. **Rule 2.7** states if you choose not to wear a coat due to hot weather conditions the following applies:

- Wear a light coloured shirt
- The shirt must be tucked in if you are female and worried about your tummy then wear a jacket!
- The collar of the shirt must be either a rat catcher or business style collar
- There must be sleeves either long or short
- T shirts and sleeveless shirts are not allowed

The **penalty** for not complying with the above is **minus 2 marks** from each judge. In relation to EA tests Prelim to Adv this equates to approximately minus 1.25% if there are 2 judges – too much to throw away for careless mistakes.


Advertising & Publicity on Riders & Horses – EA General Regulations Article 135


Stewards have been known, especially at big events e.g. CDIs to actually measure to logos on jackets and saddle cloths. I must say some that I have seen exceed the allowed measurement. Riders need to be aware of the following.

While present in the Competition area and during the prize giving ceremonies the name and/or logo of the individual's sponsor(s) and/or team sponsor(s) may appear on a surface area not exceeding:

- 200² cm on each side of the saddle cloth this is the total size for all logos NOT for each logo
 - 200°cm can be made up of 10cm x 20cm or 5cm by 40cm etc as long as the dimensions when multiplied equal 200cm if you compete at a CDI expect for these logos to be measured by the FEI Steward!!!!!! So you had better make sure they are within the correct size.
- 80² cm only once on jackets or top garments at the height of breast pockets
 - 80²cm can be made up of 10cm x 8cm, 5cm x 16cm etc as long as the dimensions when multiplied equal
 80cm
- 16²cm on shirt collars
 - 16² cm can be made up of 2cm x 8cm etc
- 400²cm on horse rugs
 - 400² cm can be made up of e.g 10cm x 40cm or 5cm x 80cm

So, if you have logos on you saddle cloth, coat, shirt or horse rug please take the time to measure them and make sure that they are legal. For the full wording of the Article please go here - http://www.equestrian.org.au/site/equestrian/national/downloads/2005/Rules%20as%20of%201%20July%202013/Equestrian%20Australia%20General%20Regulations.pdf – is well worth a read if you have logos on yourself or your horse.





Given that this is a new rule Gear Stewards are measuring the whip when it is carried on a pony. Please make sure your whip is the correct length or at Gear Check you will have to have the whip cut to the correct length or decide not to carry one.

Whips General - Rule 2.6

- Only one whip (of the required length) may be carried and used in the exercise and warm-up arena
- A lunging whip may be used when lunging a horse/pony
- At National & any State Championships a whip may be carried up to and including Advanced level competitions
- In FEI competitions at National and any State Championships carrying a whip is not allowed

Bits (Rule 2.10.1) – The minimum diameter of a snaffle bit for horses and ponies is 10mm (for Young Horses competitions it is 14mm). If you are unsure of the size of your bit then I suggest you get it measured properly with a bit measure or caliper. You cannot measure a bit with a ruler!!! If you see me at an event I always have both pieces of equipment with me and I would be more than happy to measure your bit for you. The bit is measured adjacent to the rings of the bit.

Saddles & Bridles (Rule 2.9 & 2.10) – These can only be brown or black

Padding on the Bridle (Rule 2.10) – Padding is allowed UNDER bridles but any padding used must be discreet and applied to the underside of the bridle only

Nosebands (Rule 2.10.1) – A noseband is compulsory. The wearing of two nosebands at an event is not permitted and will entail elimination. Diagrams of approved nosebands are in the rule book see rule 2.20

Boots, bell boots and bandages (Rule 2.13) – if these are worn in the space around the arena you will incur a minus 2 from each judge. These items must be removed before you present for gear check

Codes of Conduct—Did you know that that there are several Code of Conducts we are all bound by – they cover General, Competitors, Officials, Spectators. There is also a Social Media Policy that we are bound by as well. Tyou can also find them on the EA website – Social Media here - http://www.equestrian.org.au/policies, Codes of Conduct here - http://www.equestrian.org.au/default.asp?Page=7209&MenuID=Equestrian_Australia%2F11754%2F0

Judges—Judges are required to stay for up to 30 minutes after the final results for a competition that they have judged. The reason for this is so that once the riders get their test sheets if they wish to discuss their result with the relevant judge/s then they can do so. It is stressed that this should be done in a polite non-confrontational manner and you must have your test sheets with you that the judge/s concerned can refer to and refresh their memory. A bit hard to remember all 35 horses in a comp!!!!! It should also take place in a private area. Please take the time to stay and discuss your concerns with the judge/s concerned rather than leave early and then 'have a go' at judge/s on social media (refer to the EA Social Media Policy). Judges are more than happy to discuss your test with you. If there has been a discrepancy in the marks and it is more than 8% if an EA test or 5% if an FEI test you can rest assured that the judges of the competition will have already discussed the discrepancy. This is a requirement in the rules for this to happen.

Entry of Horses – Rule 1.9—One horse per rider. This means that if you have ridden your horse in one competition at an event you can't get another rider in any subsequent competitions at the same event. The definition of an event is the whole event whether it be over 1, 2, 3 or more days.

Dress – Rule 2.1—Note that mini hacking tails are NOT allowed at any level.

Headgear - Rule 2.2

- All riders under 18 years must wear an approved safety helmet
- All riders of horses under 7 years of age must wear approved head gear regardless of the age of the rider
- The chin strap of an approved safety helmet must be secure

• If your hat comes off during a test the C judge must stop the test so that the hat can be retrieved and put back on. Assistance from outside is allowed for this purpose. When the hat has been retrieved and replaced the test and judging will continue from where it was stopped.

Fly Hoods – Rule 2.15

- These are allowed to be worn for outdoor warm-up and competition NOT indoors
- If you wear a fly hood then you MUST re-present to gear check AFTER your test and remove the fly hood so that it may be inspected and the ears of the horse may be inspected
- Riders must remove the fly hood once they have reported to the gear check and not before
- The fly hood must be made of thin material and the covering over the ears must NOT be insulated against sound
- The colour of the fly hood must be discreet brown on a brown horse, black on a black horse, white or grey on a grey – is ideal – no bright blues, green etc
- The fly hood must not cover the eyes of the horse

Spurs - Rule 2.5

- Non-compliance or incorrect spurs will entail elimination
 - Spurs are optional in all levels of EA competitions
 - Spurs are compulsory in FEI competitions at FEI sanctioned events e.g. CDIs
 - Spurs must be made of metal
- A curved or straight shank must point directly back from the centre of the spur when on the rider's boot
- The **tip** of the shank must not point up or point inwards
- The arms of the spur must be smooth
- If rowels are used, they must be blunt/smooth and free to rotate. Daisy rowels are permitted
- Rowels must be in a vertical plane
- Rowels in a horizontal plane are not permitted
- There is no maximum length of spurs
- Metal spurs with hard plastic knobs are allowed
- Dummy spurs with no shank are allowed
- Impuls spurs are permitted

Lunging – Rule 2.14—Usually at an event there is a designated lunging area. If so make sure that you use it and don't lunge in the warm-up area. Non-compliance will entail elimination.

- · Lunging cavessons are permitted
- · Only one lunge rein may be used
- Snaffles with a cavesson or a normal dropped noseband, Mexican noseband or a Flash noseband, running martingales (with snaffle only), boots and bandages are allowed
- One or two direct side reins or double sliding side reins (triangle, dreick zugel) (the latter solely when lunging only with one lunge line) are permitted
- The lunging of a rider mounted in the saddle is not permitted anywhere at the event
- · Ear muffs are permitted

Use of Voice – Rule 3.16—Don't throw away valuable marks by using your voice or clicking your tongue repeatedly. The use of the voice or clicking the tongue repeatedly is a serious fault, which should be considered in the mark for the movement. Note that the use of voice is permitted in some cases in PE Dressage as an aid. See Section 13.7 of the rule book for more details. It is up to the judge to determine what the penalty will be and it will be deducted from the mark that would have been given for the movement (not all judges will hear it so not all judges will penalise).

Retiring from a Test

If for whatever reason you decide that you are going to retire from the test the standard way to do this is to stop and raise your hand in the air to indicate to the judge that you are going to retire. Leave the arena at the walk (if you can!).

Error of Course - Rule 3.17

If you have a memory lapse and forget the test the judge will in most instances ring the bell. If this happens the judge will tell you where you went wrong and what the next movement is so that hopefully you will then remember. Make sure you give yourself enough room to get the horse going again after it has been stopped (perhaps pick up the test from the movement prior to the error) and judging will re-commence at the point where you went wrong. E.g. If you were on a left rein to turn up the centre line at A and instead went past A and the bell was sounded then you need to go back to the long side at about E and do the movement correctly. This should give you enough time to get your horse going again and make the correct turn at A onto the centre line.

In principle a competitor is not allowed to repeat a movement of the test unless the Chief Judge decides on it being an error of course (rings the bell). If, however, the rider has started the execution of a movement and attempts to do the same movement again, the judges must consider only the first movement shown and at the same time penalise for an error of course.

Don't be embarrassed about having an error of course – it happens to everyone at some time or other and sometimes to professional riders at the highest level.

The judges doesn't always ring the bell for an error of course – some examples (not exhaustive):

- When the final halt is at X instead of G or vice versa
- At the salute, not taking the reins in one hand
- Competitor makes an early transition from medium trot to collected walk
- Cantering up the centre line from A, makes a pirouette at D instead of at L
- Does rising trot instead of sitting trot or vice versa in a non-mirrored movement

The judge should ring the bell in the following instances:

- Enters the arena at the incorrect pace
- Turns right instead of left or vice versa
- · Omits a movement
- When a movement is the first of a mirror image and the competitor rides:
 - rising trot instead of sitting trot or vice versa
 - an incorrect size circle

Young Horse

By Karen Crommelin

In May a small contingent of Queensland riders made the trip to 2014 Sydney CDI with their young horses to contest the NSW Young Horse Championship classes and were well rewarded for their efforts. These classes are sponsored by the Hanoverian Horse Society who also brings out a test rider who conducts the ride for the judges in the 3rd round. This year the very experienced trainer Anna Sophia Fiekelborn again made the trip out from Germany to assess the finalists.

4yr old young horse champion was Derreen Rock N Rolla ridden by Sheridyn Ashwood (pictured left below). He is a chestnut stallion by Rockstar out of a De Niro dam and was bred in New Zealand by Benn Conn and is now owned by Steve and Janice Elliot and Phil Bobic. Mattea Davidson on her stallion Sambucca D also made the top 10 in the 4yr old class.

Narrowly missing out on the championship in the 5 yr old class was the imported grey mare Seestern by Quarter-back ridden by Emma Flavelle (pictured right below) and owned by Ingrid Jennings. Still a fantastic effort to bring home the reserve champion award.

In the 6yr old Jayden Brown placed 4th on Lacoste F and Lesleigh Kruse won the consolation round on her gelding Ambathala Cellini.

Locally in Queensland on the 6th April PRARG hosted a young horse event sponsored by Hanoverian breeders Jembrae Warmblood Stud. The 4yr old class was won by Fairbanks Ipod ridden by Deziree Roos and closely behind in 2nd was another Fairbanks horse Fairbanks Stiletto ridden by stud owner Russ Davidson. The 5yr old class was won by Elite Destiny ridden by me in another close result with 2nd to the locally bred Harrier Hill Falconess ridden by Victoria Welch. The 6yr old class was won by the imported gelding Fibrizio ridden by Libby Welch. Nice to see 2 out of the 3 class winners bred here in Queensland.

In results just to hand as I write this, Caboolture Dressage Group has once again included young horse classes in their Great South East Queensland Championships and the classes looked to be well supported. The 4 yr old winner again a locally bred horse Highfields Capitano ridden by Deb Oliver; 5yr old the imported licensed Hanoverian stallion Fiderurst ridden by Emma Flavelle and owned by Lars and Madonna Hedburg and the 6yr old class again won by Fibrizio ridden and owned by Libby Welch.

Next on the calendar is the Queensland State Young Horse Championships to be held in conjunction with the Brisbane CDI in July. It should be an interesting event as there are very strong fields in the young horse classes this year.



It was great to see good pony numbers at both Toowoomba and Caboolture recently. Even better to see the quality of the tests. I get the impression that the judges are enjoying judging the pony tests, which has not always been the case in the past. There's nothing much between the top few which is motivating everyone to work that much harder.

Two riders who ride beautifully accurate tests are Indiana Anderson on Mister Crescendo and Isabella Wilkinson-McIntyre on Nawarrah Park Red Rose. It was great to see them ride at Elementary at Caboolture after virtually having a monopoly on the lower levels in the past. (Results still not out but from memory they took Champion and Reserve) These ponies were Novice Champion and reserve at Toowoomba with scores close to 70%.

Lyn Muller on Honeywood Mystical Girl made the trip to Caboolture from NSW for success in the Elementary classes so the standard was as good as we've seen at that level for a while.

That's not to take anything away from the lovely Double S Eclipse who was Elementary Champion at Toowoomba, but didn't start at Caboolture. Great also to see Double S Dark Sun competing again to take the Medium Championship at Toowoomba.

We also saw pony entries in both Advanced and PSG at both competitions although there were some scratchings at Caboolture and we saw only 1 starter in the Advanced and no PSG at Caboolture, however looming exams for high schoolers, and end of financial year seemed to be the culprit there.

The ever improving Imperial Austin continued his success of recent times with Ashlyn Dyer, and is currently topping the Pony Leaderboard this year. He was Reserve Champion Preliminary at both Toowoomba and Caboolture. My recycled broodmare and harness pony Glenormiston Aedin was champion Preliminary pony at Caboolture having handled the heavy sand a little better than some of the smaller ponies.

It was nice to see ponies in the Young Horse classes, with wins for Burrowa Bodicia in the 4yo and Greenacres First Lady in the 6yo. Apologies if we had a 5yo pony winner as I can't confirm at this stage. A close second in the 4yo was Jackie Clark's Rahane Portia who is related to her successful dressage pony Rahane Petrina and also looks to have great potential.

There were some new faces in the pony classes who were happy to be amongst the placings. Alex Hayes and Sanlirra Xceptional have come to pony dressage from much success in the show ring. Thanks to a little nudge from her coach, I believe). It's great that the coaches are encouraging more competitors into the pony classes. We really appreciate it.

The Medium at Caboolture was a closely fought contest amongst some very experienced ponies, being Rahane Caleb, Carousel Appley Dappley and Jobar Piano Man. I'm not sure who claimed the championship but I know it was a close contest.

It's also nice to see the success of some of our pony riders who have 'graduated' to horses, notably Hannah Barker and Justine Dean. Well done to you both.

I'm hoping that we will have some Pony Leaderboard entries from the August competitions at Atherton Tablelands, Far North Equestrian Group, and Fraser Coast Championships during August. For the rest of us there's LEGS and Samford during August as the next leaderboard events. But don't forget that ALL official results count towards the other end of year DQ trophies, so keep those ponies out there!!

Club Spotlight Caboolture Dressage Group

Caboolture Dressage Group Inc (CDG) was formed in the late 1970's in the back yard of local equestrian identity Bev Semple. Bev and a group of like minded horse-mad ladies got together and ran a few competitions. Interest grew in dressage as did the club. Competitions moved to the main oval of the Caboolture AP&I Association (Caboolture Show Society) and CDG became part of the Show Society. At this time Tom Doyle, local veterinarian, was heavily involved in organising eventing and show jumping events as well. Bev remains our Cub Patron and still holds an interest in the club and its events.

As the interest in dressage grew so did our members and our events. The Sunday markets at the Showgrounds started to have a detrimental effect on our competitions so when the opportunity to move to the Alexander Barr Sporting Complex (Barr Oval) came about, CDG jumped at the chance to have their own grounds. This all came about through a lot of hard work from the committee at the time. CDG moved their events to Barr Oval with no facilities, except portable dressage arenas.

Gradually facilities such as canteen and football change rooms, toilets and a shed were provided. The first toilet block CDG had at Barr Oval in the float parking area was a portable block that had originally come from Expo. The toilet block had been moved from Expo to Beachmere and was about to be replaced by a new block. Once again the hard working committee heard about it and arranged for it to be moved to CDG grounds. That toilet block lasted years until it became unsafe to use. With continual applications to the Council (then Caboolture Shire Council) CDG finally got a new toilet block including showers. We thought we had it made!

Before the fancy new toilet block came to fruition we had managed to get 4 sand arenas installed at Barr Oval. One of the first clubs in Queensland to have such facilities. Over the years CDG has improved the facilities by adding another storage shed, providing a permanent gear check area, & with funding from Equestrian Qld provided shade shelters at each arena for the comfort of spectators.

CDG has always run events to cater for our members, competitors who just like to compete for the fun of it and competitors who wish to reach the highest levels i.e. State and National Squads. The club runs many clinics throughout the year to encourage our members to get out there and try. CDG subsidises all of these clinics so our members really get great value for their annual membership.

We run 4-6 official events each year, the largest being the Great South Eastern Championships in June. In addition to the official events we run 6 non-official events and 4-6 Picnic Days for members only. Each August we host a fund raising event where the proceeds go to a prior nominated charity. The day is based on a colour related to the chosen charity and we hold a special fancy dress class for all levels of rider to compete in. CDG have been holding this event for the past 12 years.

In 2011 CDG came under the QSEC umbrella. The Moreton Bay Regional Council opened the new Indoor Arena at QSEC and the associated stables. So between the 4 sand outdoor arenas and the indoor arena the facilities are now first class. The Council is continuing to improve and increase the facilities for the benefit of all equestrian sports. CDG benefits greatly from the association we have with QSEC and we look forward to a strong and lasting relationship with them.

As with most clubs CDG is run by an enthusiastic committee – small in size but big in heart. We are well known for our ability to organise well run events where all riders are treated equally. On our website you will find membership forms and details, a calendar of events and details about where we are situated. www.caboolturedressage.org.au We also have a Facebook page so why not jump on and "like" us so you can keep up with all the information.





PARA-EQUESTRIAN Para Equestrian Leaderboard

We are pleased to announce that the Para Equestrian Leaderboard has secured the Festival of Dressage as the sponsor for 2014. We would like to take this opportunity to thank the committee for their support of all Para Equestrians in Queensland and Dressage Queensland for their input in establishing the criteria. The Festival of Dressage champions for both the EA Para Equestrian of the Year and the FEI Para Equestrian of the Year will be announced at the Dressage Queensland Annual Awards night.

The criteria approved by Dressage Queensland is as follows:

- 1. Athletes must hold a classification card to be on the leader board—this classification card can either be an EA card or FEI card.
- Scores have to be attained from events holding EA classes either Competitive or Participant, with preferably 2. two judges. This would include interschool events in Queensland, interstate official events and international
- Scores can be taken from EA tests, EA Para Dressage tests and FEI PE tests held in Queensland and other 3. states. If submitting FEI PE test scores, then they must be in your Grade, i.e. if you are classified a Grade III Para Equestrian then the scores submitted can be from any Grade III FEI PE tests, not a Grade 1A or 1B test.
- 4. No "open" or "restricted" club days or club day classes count.
- 5. Scores must be taken from two different events—can't use two scores from the one event.
- Scores will be taken from combinations only. You can have more than one combination on the leader board. 6.
- 7. You don't go on the leader board until you have attained two scores with each combination.
- Athletes must send in proof of performance—either copy of the test sheet or copy of the result sheet. 8.
- Athletes must be current financial members—either Competitive or Participant. 9.



EVENT PROCEDURES FOR DRESSAGE QLD FESTIVAL OF DRESSAGE AMATEUR OWNER/RIDER LEADER BOARD

- Only Official Competitive competitions apply.
- Only current financial Competitive members of Equestrian Qld are eligible.
- Only horses are eligible for the Amateur Owner/Rider FOD Leader Board.
- Only riders and horses that are eligible according to the Amateur Owner/Rider (AOR) Fact Sheet may enter.
- > Competitors are to identify at the time of entry if they wish to enter a horse as eligible for the AOR Leader Board.
- Normal grading points apply as per current Equestrian Australia rules.
- All horses will be placed in the same draw unless, at the discretion of the Organising Committee, the entries warrant a splitting of the class.
- The result sheets will show the entire competition results.
- Ribbons, prizes and prizemoney will be presented as per normal for the entire class.
- > The AORs will be tagged on the entire results.
- The 'extra award' AOR rosettes will be presented to the Amateur Owner/Rider placegetters.
- There will be no prizes or prizemoney associated with placing as an AOR at Leader Board events.
- At the discretion of the Organising Committee, an overall AOR champion prize may be awarded.
- The end of year overall AOR at each level will be awarded a prize at the annual Dressage Qld Awards Function.
- The levels included in the Dressage Qld 2014 FOD Leader Board are: Preliminary, Novice, Elementary, Medium, Advanced, Prix St Georges & Intermediate 1.

NATIONAL AMATEUR OWNER/RIDER DIVISION—FACT SHEET

Criteria

In order to qualify as an amateur owner rider, all riders must declare that they meet the following criteria:

- The rider must be a Competitive member of their state branch of Equestrian Australia.
- To qualify as an Amateur Owner/Rider the rider must not have competed in an FEI Sanctioned CDI (PSG-GP) or CDI-W in the prior 3 calendar years.
- The horse must have a life registration with Equestrian Australia.
- The horse/pony registration lodged with Equestrian Australia must reflect the name of the amateur owner rider as owner of the horse. Leased horse are only permitted if the registration papers reflect the lessee as the "owner".
- An amateur owner rider must not have derived any sponsorship, gifts or remuneration above the value of \$500/annum for any services connected with the breaking, training and riding of any horse or pony in the last 3 years.
- An amateur owner rider's principle source of income is not obtained from sponsorship, breaking, training,
 riding or coaching any horse or rider.
- The horse/pony must be primarily ridden and trained by the rider/owner with only periodic ridden assistance by person(s) other than the owner. Specifically the horse/pony must not have been ridden or trained by anyone, other than the owner, from the closing date of entries to the day of the event, for any event in which the rider wishes to compete as an amateur owner rider.

Organisation

- The Division is for Official Competitive classes. The Organising Committees may run this Division at any level
 (ideally at all levels Preliminary GP) and it can be run either within the class or separately.
- Organising Committees may choose to designate the Amateur Owner Rider on the draw.
- For a State/Regional/Club Leaderboard it would be ideal to select a number of events at which scores will
 count towards the annual Leaderboard.
