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# Chairperson Report

It is my pleasure to present the 2025 Chair's Report for Equestrian Queensland (EQ).

Equestrian sport in Queensland continues to be built on the dedication of our members: riders, coaches, officials, volunteers, owners and supporters, who contribute countless hours to ensure our sport thrives. On behalf of the EQ Board, I thank every member for the passion and commitment you bring to the equestrian community.

## Recognising the Challenges Facing Members

While the strength of our community remains clear, it is also important to acknowledge that the past year has presented several challenges for many participants in our sport.

Across Queensland, members continue to navigate rising costs associated with horse ownership, travel, competition participation and facility access. Clubs and volunteers are also facing increased regulatory, insurance and operational requirements, placing additional pressure on those who generously give their time to deliver events and participation opportunities.

At a national level, members have also experienced significant increases in Equestrian Australia membership fees and levies, with some categories increasing substantially during the year. These changes have understandably created concern among members about affordability and value.

The EQ Board and management recognise these pressures and remain focused on ensuring that membership continues to deliver meaningful value through strong member services, support for clubs and volunteers, investment in safety and welfare initiatives, and advocacy for the long-term sustainability of our sport.

## Supporting Members and Clubs

Throughout 2025, EQ has continued to prioritise initiatives that support participation and strengthen the foundations of our sport in Queensland.

Our affiliated clubs remain the backbone of equestrian sport delivery. EQ has continued working closely with clubs and discipline committees to support event delivery, provide governance guidance, and assist volunteers in navigating the increasingly complex environment in which sport operates.

Education and development also remain a focus, with ongoing support provided for coaches, officials and volunteers to ensure the continued quality and integrity of equestrian sport in Queensland. EQ remains committed to ensuring that members have opportunities to participate in equestrian activities at all levels, from grassroots participation through to high performance pathways.

## Equestrian Facilities and Infrastructure

Access to suitable equestrian facilities remains one of the most significant long-term issues facing our sport. In recent years, EQ has worked collaboratively with government and industry stakeholders to advocate for improved equestrian infrastructure across Queensland. This work is guided by the state-wide facilities planning undertaken by EQ and supported by our ongoing engagement with local and state government.

Encouragingly, progress continues to be made on several facility initiatives, including Toowoomba Showgrounds and QSEC. EQ is also proud to have continued its partnership with Park Ridge Active Riding Group and Dressage Queensland to support the delivery of enhanced facilities, including the Martin Collins waxed fibre surfaces and new indoor arena.

Looking ahead to the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games, EQ will continue advocating for a lasting equestrian legacy that benefits the broader Queensland equestrian community.

## Governance and National Collaboration

Equestrian sport in Australia operates within a federated national structure. During the year, there has been significant discussion across the sport regarding governance, constitutional reform and the future structure of Equestrian Australia. EQ remains committed to constructive national collaboration that strengthens the sport while ensuring members continue to have a meaningful voice in decision-making.

Throughout the year, EQ has consulted with Queensland members and represented their views in national discussions, including the Equestrian Australia AGM and Special General Meetings and recent strategy forums. The EQ Board remains committed to continuing this dialogue with members, branches and Equestrian Australia as the sport works towards sustainable governance arrangements for the future.

## Safety and Horse Welfare

The safety of participants and the welfare of horses remain fundamental priorities for EQ.

Equestrian sport inherently involves risk, and it is essential that our policies, education programs and event standards continue to evolve to support best practice safety and welfare outcomes. EQ continues to work with clubs and officials to ensure risk management practices are understood and implemented across competitions and activities. Protecting the wellbeing of horses and riders will always remain central to the integrity and future of our sport.

## Acknowledgements

On behalf of EQ, I would like to sincerely thank my fellow Board Directors, Karim Cham, Peta Fielding, Naomi Lane, Dave Holland and Gary Lung for their commitment and service to equestrian sport in Queensland.

I also extend our gratitude to the EQ sport committees, affiliated clubs and the many volunteers across Queensland who deliver events, training opportunities and competitions throughout the year. The success of equestrian sport in Queensland is only possible because of your efforts.

# Treasurer Report

## Financial Statements to 31 December 2025

Equestrian Queensland (EQ) continued to play an important role in supporting and promoting equestrian sport across the state during 2025. Through its various disciplines, competitions and development initiatives, EQ remains committed to delivering opportunities for riders, officials and volunteers while supporting the long-term sustainability of the organisation.

The Board is pleased to present the Financial Statements of Equestrian Queensland (EQ) for the year ended 31 December 2025.

Total income for the year was \$2.37 million (2024: \$2.62 million). The reduction compared with the prior year primarily reflects lower event income and investment returns. Encouragingly, key income streams including membership subscriptions and horse registrations remained stable and continue to provide a reliable foundation for the Association's operations.

Total expenditure for the year was \$2.48 million (2024: \$2.72 million). Expenses decreased across a number of operational areas, particularly in relation to event delivery and discipline activities, while employee and administration costs remained broadly consistent with prior years.

The net operating result for the year was \$103,503, broadly consistent with the \$102,347 operating result recorded in 2024. This outcome reflects EQ's continued investment in programs, competitions and initiatives that support members and the ongoing development of equestrian sport throughout Queensland.

EQ continues to maintain a strong financial position, with total members' equity of \$1.16 million at 31 December 2025 and cash reserves of \$1.10 million. The operating result for the year represents less than 9% of accumulated reserves, demonstrating that the Association remains financially stable and well placed to support future activities and strategic initiatives.

The Board and management continue to actively monitor the Association's financial performance and maintain prudent financial management practices to support the long-term sustainability of EQ.

Membership fees and levies continue to be managed with diligence to ensure funds are applied effectively and in accordance with their intended purpose.

EQ would also like to acknowledge and thank the many volunteers, officials and organisers whose contribution plays a vital role in delivering competitions and programs across Queensland. Without their dedication and support, the cost of delivering these activities would be significantly higher.

The Board appointed Moore Australia's Brisbane office as auditors for the 2025 financial audit and recommends that they be reappointed for the 2026 financial year.

# CEO Report

2025 has been a year of steady progress for Equestrian Queensland (EQ), delivered against a backdrop of rising costs, increasing regulatory expectations and ongoing change within the national equestrian landscape.

Despite these pressures, the strength of equestrian sport in Queensland continues to be driven by the dedication of our clubs, volunteers, officials and participants. Across the state, competitions, training opportunities and development programs continue to be delivered through the commitment of those who contribute their time and expertise to the sport.

EQ remains focused on supporting this community through effective administration, strong member services and practical support for clubs and volunteers.

## Supporting Members and Clubs

Our affiliated clubs remain the foundation of equestrian sport delivery in Queensland. Throughout 2025, EQ has continued working closely with clubs and discipline committees to support competition delivery, provide governance guidance and assist volunteers navigating an increasingly complex operating environment.

EQ also continues to support the development of coaches, officials and volunteers through education and training initiatives that help maintain the standards and integrity of our sport.

These efforts ensure members have opportunities to participate at all levels of equestrian sport, from grassroots participation through to high-performance pathways.

## Systems and Service Delivery

During the year, EQ continued working with Equestrian Australia (EA) and other state branches on the implementation and refinement of the national membership and administration system, JustGo.

While the new system presents opportunities to modernise sport administration and improve the member experience, its implementation has also created challenges for EQ, members and clubs. EQ continues to advocate for system improvements to address these issues and enhance usability. Internally, EQ has also refined processes and communication to ensure responsive and effective support for members and clubs.

## Horse Welfare and Safety

The welfare of horses and the safety of participants remain fundamental priorities for Equestrian Queensland. EQ continues to work closely with Equestrian Australia (EA), affiliated clubs and officials to promote best-practice safety standards, strong risk management and responsible horse welfare across all equestrian activities. Maintaining these standards is essential to protecting participants and sustaining the long-term social licence of equestrian sport.

In 2026, EQ will expand the services and support available to event organisers and members, including additional resources, guidance and training to strengthen the capacity of those delivering events on the ground.

## Looking Ahead

While the sport continues to face challenges, including rising participation costs and potential structural change, the commitment of the Queensland equestrian community provides strong confidence for the future. EQ will remain focused on strengthening participation, supporting clubs and volunteers, improving member services and advocating for the infrastructure and policy settings required for the sport to thrive.

## CEO Report Cont.

### Key Focus for 2026

In the year ahead, Equestrian Queensland will focus on several priority areas to strengthen the sport and support members across the state:

- Supporting clubs and volunteers through enhanced resources, governance guidance and education to assist with the delivery of safe and sustainable events.
- Improving member services, communication and systems, including ongoing advocacy for improvements to national JustGo membership and administration platforms.
- Advancing equestrian infrastructure, including updating the EQ Facilities Strategy to align with opportunities presented by the Brisbane 2032 Olympic and Paralympic Games.
- Strengthening safety and horse welfare initiatives, including expanded resources and training for officials and event organisers.
- Promoting participation and development pathways to support riders from grassroots participation through to high-performance sport.

I would like to thank the EQ staff team, Samantha Duffy, Tarni McCormack, Melinda Robinson, Jodie Daly, Genevieve Frunz, Sandi-Leigh Norris, Mirran Robinson, Charlotte Drynan and Jennifer Bain (currently on maternity leave) for their professionalism and dedication throughout the year.

I also extend my sincere appreciation to the EQ Board, sport committees and the many volunteers, officials, coaches and clubs whose efforts make equestrian sport possible across Queensland.




# Funding Distribution



## **Sport Development & Member Development**

Equestrian Queensland provided \$67,000 in funding to affiliated clubs and EQ Sport Committees to support discipline-specific initiatives focused on member development, club capability, expand rider participation, and strengthen governance. This funding supported activities such as rider development clinics, protocol days, and other discipline-led education and training opportunities delivered by clubs and sport committees.

In addition, EQ allocated a further \$2,500 to regional affiliated clubs to assist with judges' travel expenses, supporting the delivery of competitions and development opportunities in Dressage, Eventing, and Jumping in regional areas.



## **Officials Education**

EQ provided \$12,000 to support the development of EA accredited Officials by providing funds to assist with the delivery of accreditation courses and funds to assist with travel expenses associated with officials attending EA/FEI courses.



## **Coaching Education**

EQ provided \$14,000 to support the growth and development of EA Coaches, SSTA's and Coach Educators through the delivery of EA accreditation courses and assessment.



## **High Performance & Youth Development**

EQ provided \$46,000 to support the development of junior and elite athletes through the EQ Development and High Performance Sport Committee programs.



## **Medication Control**

EQ provided \$33,500 to deliver the Medication Control Program (swabbing) to ensure that all horses are competing without the influence of prohibited substances. This funding is made available through a financial contribution from each new life horse registration with EQ.



## **Event Funding**

EQ provided \$62,500 to affiliated Clubs and EQ Sport Committees to support the delivery of major events.

# Coaching Advisory Group

Looking back over the last 12 months, the Equestrian Queensland Coaching Advisory Group (EQ CAG) has had a busy year in our commitment to coaches across the state and endeavouring to provide development opportunities for all coaches, whether they be trainee candidates embarking on their coaching journey or experienced coaches with many years under their belt. In late March, EQ supported the chair of CAG Emma Morel (Level 2G and CE) and Karen Foran (Level 1 Vaulting Coach and SSTA), enabling them to attend the AIS Coaching and Officiating Conference held in Geelong. The event was attended by EA representatives Michelle Clough and Michelle James, as well as other states. It was an opportunity to hear about current coaching theory and relevant issues across many sports.

In April the CAG ran a face-to-face EA coach update with Simon Kale who delivered the compulsory Equestrian Australia component and two practical coaching masterclasses. The coaches who attended also enjoyed an illuminating session by Karen Crommelin on Social Licence in Equestrian Sport and a wonderfully interactive session with Exercise Scientist and rider Mel Macaulay from Strong Stable Seat. These face-to-face sessions are well received by coaches who value the ability to interact with other coaches and presenters in a way that is not possible over a Zoom or Microsoft Teams presentation.

Following on from the coach update, a Coaching Development and Intensive workshop was run at Fig Tree Pocket with Simon Kale, David Finch and Emma Morel. A total of ten candidates attended, one Introductory Coach, five Level One Coaches and four Level Two coaches successful in achieving their qualifications.

The Queensland CAG also congratulates Gary Lung and Nicole Tough on successfully attaining their EA Level 3 qualifications this year. This is a huge achievement, and Queensland is very fortunate to have 2 more coaches recognised at this level.

Brett Cattle’s resignation from the CAG during the year was a double-edged sword. It was a blow to the CAG, but a great benefit of the EQ community with his nomination to the EQ Board and his subsequent role on the EA Board is a win for all EA members.

Queensland coaches Darryn Fedrick and Sally Collins were recognised for their success and commitment to coaching in EA’s highly competitive “Coach of the Month” this year. Both had wonderful stories to tell about their coaching experiences.

At the end of 2025 Trudy Dougall and Darryn Fedrick facilitated a SSTA and CE accreditation course at Burpengary Pony Club. A total of three achieved their qualification, including a Vaulting specialist.

Michelle Clough (EA Sports Development Officer – Coaching) has initiated a monthly meeting with all the state chairs of coaching committees. This has enabled robust discussions and an open channel for discussing and initiating ideas to improve and standardise coaching across Australia.

# Dressage Queensland Report

In 2025, Dressage Queensland delivered a strong and well managed calendar of events. While participation numbers were lower across the board, the standard of competition remained high. We extend our sincere thanks to our clubs, officials, volunteers, and riders for their dedication throughout the season. Members continued to benefit from a diverse range of well run events, with clubs consistently going above and beyond to provide high quality experiences.

A major milestone this year was the completion of the long awaited indoor arena project at the PRARG grounds, made possible with the support of Equestrian Queensland. Members have expressed the need for an indoor facility for many years, and combined with the Dressage Queensland wax fibre surface, we now have an exceptional venue for competition. PRARG, with the assistance of local council, has worked tirelessly over many years to secure this development, and we thank them for their persistence and commitment. Although the construction period limited access to the grounds during the latter part of the 2025 season, the outcome has been well worth the temporary disruption.

This new facility will allow more events to proceed safely in adverse weather, protecting both horses and riders.

The Dressage Queensland Riders Subcommittee delivered a reduced competition schedule at PRARG due to the indoor arena works. In 2025, Dressage Queensland also hosted the National Amateur Owner Rider (AOR) Championships at QSEC. This rider focused event attracted strong interstate participation and received overwhelmingly positive feedback from competitors and sponsors. We acknowledge Dr Show as our naming rights sponsor, along with the many suppliers who contributed prizes and trade support. We look forward to hosting this event again in 2026.

The Saddlefitter Brisbane CDI continued to be a vibrant and high quality fixture on the calendar, supported by live streaming and an active social media presence. We were pleased to welcome a panel of international judges who generously shared their expertise with our riders. We also welcomed many new and interstate competitors, and we thank all riders who committed to travelling significant distances to attend. Our sincere appreciation goes to all sponsors, particularly The Saddlefitter for their continued naming rights support.

Our hardworking Officials Subcommittee once again delivered an extensive program of workshops, seminars, webinars, and judge upgrades—more than any other state. Their contribution remains vital to the ongoing development of our sport.

# Jumping Queensland Report

Jumping Queensland remains committed to advancing the sport of showjumping across the state by supporting competitions, developing athletes and officials, and working closely with affiliated clubs to strengthen participation and performance pathways.

Throughout 2025, the committee focused on delivering key championship events, supporting club competitions, and providing opportunities for officials to maintain and renew their accreditations. The continued support and dedication of affiliated clubs remains critical to the growth and sustainability of jumping in Queensland, and the committee extends its sincere appreciation to all clubs and volunteers who contribute to the delivery of competitions across the state.

Queensland Jump Club delivered the Festival of Showjumping, featuring an FEI World Cup Qualifier at QSEC, Caboolture from June 20–29, 2025 featuring 7 days of jumping competition over 10 days. This event attracted strong participation from interstate riders and showcased Queensland’s ability to deliver high-level international competition.

Queensland Jump Club also hosted the Jumping State Championships, with increased competitor numbers compared with the previous year.

Jumping Queensland successfully hosted the 2025 Queensland Country Jumping Championships at Maryborough, attracting strong participation and continuing to support opportunities for riders outside metropolitan areas.

Jumping Queensland acknowledges the significant contribution of Queensland Off-The-Track (QOTT) in supporting the development of jumping through event sponsorship and prize money. QOTT supported several competitions and provided two dedicated Off-The-Track classes at the Ekka.

QOTT also partnered with the Pacific Fair Magic Millions Showjumping and Polo event, with a qualifying class held during the Festival of Showjumping at QSEC. The Pacific Fair Magic Millions Showjumping and Polo once again proved to be a major highlight of the Queensland jumping calendar, attracting competitors from across Australia and continuing to elevate the profile of the sport.

We are proud of the Queensland riders who continue to represent the state strongly at interstate competitions throughout the year, achieving excellent results.

Jumping Queensland also continued its squad development program, receiving applications across the Junior, Young Rider and Youth Squads. Squad members participated in a three-day multi-discipline educational program, which included both mounted and off-horse learning opportunities.

These initiatives provided valuable development opportunities for emerging athletes, while also fostering connections and collaboration with athletes from other equestrian disciplines.

Officials’ education and accreditation remained a key focus throughout the year. A number of officials clinics and refresher opportunities were delivered, ensuring that judges and course designers continue to maintain the high standards required for competition. Jumping Queensland thanks affiliated clubs for hosting these important educational opportunities.

# Eventing Queensland Report

The Queensland eventing community participated in an eventful year with the usual passion and dedication from its enthusiastic members.

2025 was a positive and progressive year, delivering ongoing development in coaching, officiating, safety and event delivery.

Club memberships continue to grow in numbers, with many new grassroots level riders joining the ranks. Clubs are hosting many clinics throughout the year. We are fortunate to have such a depth of quality coaches from which to choose, and this is being reflected in the standard of competitive riding.

The calendar was jam packed with competitions of all levels. Warwick Horse Trials ran their first four star event in seventeen years, in conjunction with the State Championships. This marked an important step forward for high level competition opportunities within Queensland. RM Equestrian, Fig Tree Pocket and Fraser Coast also ran well attended events, producing many new improved fences and cross country tracks.

Tamborine Equestrian Group produced a magnificent Three Day Event, which was unfortunately lacking in numbers, due to calendar clashes interstate.

This, and other matters are currently being addressed within the committee, to ensure more support, both financial and otherwise for these Clubs.

# Interschool Queensland Report

2025 saw continued growth in participation across the Interschool competition structure. The Interschool State Committee extends its sincere thanks to Briston, Tarni, Sam and the team at Equestrian Queensland, as well as Brett Cattle and the EQ Board, for their ongoing support of our mission to create strong and sustainable riding pathways for the young riders within our equestrian community.

Once again, our regional committees from Capricornia, Wide Bay, South East and Darling and Southern Downs delivered outstanding Regional Championships. These events form the backbone of the IQ calendar, providing essential qualifying opportunities and valuable competition experience for our young riders.

The 2025 calendar presented several challenges, with adverse weather conditions resulting in postponements and cancellations. We extend our gratitude to the schools, clubs and volunteers who work tirelessly to organise these events under often difficult circumstances. The 2025 Edwards Saddleworld State Championships welcomed 269 riders and 341 horses, representing more than 125 schools. In keeping with the theme of the year, weather conditions once again tested competitors and officials alike. It is a credit to all involved that the event proceeded successfully, with riders demonstrating resilience and professionalism in challenging conditions.

We thank Jordan and the team at Edwards Saddleworld for their generous contribution and amazing support as the event Naming Rights sponsor. At the event, Jordan took the opportunity to announce the launch of the Leg Up Bursary. This initiative aims to assist a young rider in furthering their equestrian career, with prizes valued at over \$20,000 — a remarkable investment in the future of our sport.

We were excited to welcome the University of Queensland and UQ Skills as a major sponsor and to introduce the inaugural IQ Beyond The Arena Award Scholarship. The recipient of this award received a \$3,000 tuition credit toward a Diploma of Equine Management at UQ Skills, recognising excellence beyond competition results and supporting educational pathways within the equine industry. The winner Georgia Rose Klutentreter, received a \$3,000 tuition credit toward a Diploma of Equine Management at UQ Skills, recognising her excellence beyond competition results.

Team Queensland gathered for its annual training camp at Fig Tree Pocket Equestrian Club. The camp plays an important role in fostering team spirit and provides families with the opportunity to connect before spending the week together at the Australian Championships. This year's team benefited from the expertise of Emma Flegman, Mary Seefried, Suellen Brook and Mattea Davidson. # Driving Queensland Report

## Competition Pathways and Club Activity

In 2025, continued efforts were made to establish effective competition pathways, supported by the EA Driving Committee. The committee dedicated substantial time to developing pathways for officials and judges, which remains a significant challenge in organising competitions throughout Australia. During the year, only two clubs were running activity days, and one particularly active club was organising competitions. By the close of 2025, a third group became affiliated with driving opportunities for Disability and Para athletes.

### Para Driving and Virtus Driving Initiatives

Collaboration between individuals from Driving Queensland and GB POD (a training group for grassroots to International level Drivers) has led to the development of Para Driving and Virtus Driving opportunities for Australians who fit these categories. This partnership will continue throughout 2026, with the aim of gaining international recognition for Driving as a Virtus sport for athletes with intellectual impairment and/or significant autism conditions. April 2026 will mark the trial of the first Virtus Driving events at club level in Australia.

## Clinics and Competitions

Over Easter in 2025, Drivers in Queensland participated in a clinic with Robert Buck from GB Pod, in preparation for a round of the Nations Cup in Queensland. The Nations Cup is an arena-based international friendly competition that caters to participants from all levels and is held in nearly a dozen countries. The Southern Highlands Carriage Club in Bundanoon, NSW, pioneered the Nations Cup round in Australia in 2023. Now, three states—NSW, QLD, and WA—are involved in hosting these events.

In July 2025, three Queensland Drivers, who are current and past Driving Queensland Committee members, travelled to the David Broome Centre in Chepstow, Wales. There, they trained alongside a wide range of UK Drivers including those selected for the GP Para Driving team and competed in the UK leg of the Nations Cup, using loaned horses and carriages. The generosity of the British hosts was deeply appreciated. These experiences contributed valuable insights into the organisation of inclusive competitions and clinics in Australia. The Drivers also earned points for Australia in the 2025 Nations Cup, where Australia finished second to England.



## Queensland State Championships

October 2025 saw Driving Queensland host the 4th Queensland State Championships, held alongside an EA Club Championship at Nanango Showgrounds in the South Burnett region. Both Drive 1 and Drive 2 Championships were conducted, enabling another Driver, Katie Genn, to step up to FEI eligibility. This brought the number of active FEI eligible Drivers to five.

# Driving Queensland Report Cont.

## Australian Drivers' International Success

Australian Drivers continued to perform strongly overseas in 2025. The most notable achievement came from Four-in-Hand Drivers Boyd Excell and Tor van den Berg. Despite fielding only two of a possible three eligible Drivers, Australia won its first-ever Four-in-Hand CAIO Aachen Nations Cup.

## Looking Ahead to 2026

Looking to this year, increased involvement from Julie Camm and GB Pod is anticipated, along with the running of the 2026 State Championships and the Queensland leg of the Nations Cup in September. Ongoing collaboration with Equine Pathways Australia aims to further develop Para, Disability, and Virtus Driving at regular clinics hosted at Arundel Park RDA, an EQ affiliated club.

# Vaulting Queensland Report

The year commenced with vaulting being included in the Equestrian Queensland Youth Development Camp in Toowoomba for the first time. The introduction of vaulting to the program was very well received, with participants providing positive feedback on the experience and opportunity to learn more about the discipline.

In February, two Queensland vaulters travelled to Sydney to compete at the CVI competition, with both athletes achieving outstanding results by winning their respective classes.

The first competition of the year was held at Gatton as part of the Heavy Horse Festival, providing an excellent opportunity to introduce vaulting to a new audience. The event was judged by Angie Deeks (FEI Level 3 and EA Level 3 Judge), and sincere thanks are extended to Karen Foran for her efforts in organising the competition.

On 15 June, Fassifern Vaulting hosted a competition at Teviot Park, which provided valuable preparation for athletes ahead of the upcoming Interschool and Queensland State Championships.

Vaulting was also showcased at the inaugural State Interschool Vaulting Competition held in Toowoomba on 29 June, again attracting new spectators and participants. Angie Deeks officiated as the judge for this event.

This was followed by the Queensland Vaulting State Championships, which attracted 36 vaulters from across Queensland, including Sarina, as well as competitors from New South Wales. Judging was conducted by Angie Deeks (FEI Level 3), Juan Manuel Cardaci (FEI Level 3) and Anna Betts (EA Level 1).

In August, the Aceline Performance Team and two Queensland vaulters were invited to perform at the Bleach Festival on the Gold Coast. This opportunity showcased the discipline to a broader audience, with special thanks to Karen Foran for providing horses and training opportunities.

In October, two Queensland vaulters travelled to Sydney to compete at the Australian Vaulting Championships, competing successfully on borrowed horses.

The year concluded with a development clinic held on 6–7 December, featuring interstate coach EA accredited coach Tristyn Lowe. The clinic provided athletes with the opportunity to train on both a mechanical horse and their own horses. The event was well supported, and sincere thanks are extended to Queensland coaches Lucy Betts, Karen Foran and Darryn Fedrick for their support throughout the clinic.

## Notes to the Financial Statements

For the Year Ended 31 December 2025

### 1 Introductions

The financial statements cover Equestrian Queensland Inc. as an individual entity. Equestrian Queensland Inc. is a not-for-profit Association incorporated in Queensland under the *Associations Incorporation Act (QLD) 1981* ('the Act').

The functional and presentation currency of Equestrian Queensland Inc. is Australian dollars.

Comparatives are consistent with prior years, unless otherwise stated.

### 2 Basis of Preparation

In the opinion of the Committee of Management, the Association is not a reporting entity since there are unlikely to exist users of the financial statements who are not able to command the preparation of reports tailored so as to satisfy specifically all of their information needs. These special purpose financial statements have been prepared to meet the reporting requirements of the Act.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the recognition and measurement requirements of the accounting policy noted below.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

Material accounting policy information relating to the preparation of these financial statements are presented below, and are consistent with prior reporting periods unless otherwise stated.

### 3 Material Accounting Policy Information

#### (a) Revenue and other income

##### Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue is recognised on a basis that reflects the transfer of control of promised goods or services to customers at an amount that reflects the consideration the Association expects to receive in exchange for those goods or services.

Generally the timing of the payment for sale of goods and rendering of services corresponds closely to the timing of satisfaction of the performance obligations, however where there is a difference, it will result in the recognition of a receivable, contract asset or contract liability.

None of the revenue streams of the Association have any significant financing terms as there is less than 12 months between receipt of funds and satisfaction of performance obligations.

##### Specific revenue streams


The revenue recognition policies for the principal revenue streams of the Association are:

##### Membership Income

Membership income is recognised as revenue over the membership period. Unearned membership income in the statement of financial position represents amounts collected for memberships which have not yet been earned.

##### Event Income

Event income is recognised as revenue once the event has been completed.

### 3 Material Accounting Policy Information

#### (a) Revenue and other income

##### Specific revenue streams

Horse registration, squads and teams, administration income, clinics, courses and seminars and other

The Association earns revenue from provision of professional services. Revenue is recognised over time in the accounting period when services are rendered.

##### Grant revenue

Where grant income arises from an agreement which is enforceable and contains sufficiently specific performance obligations then the revenue is recognised when control of each performance obligations is satisfied.

Grant income arising from non-enforceable contracts or those without sufficiently specific performance obligations is recognised on receipt unless it relates to capital grants which meet certain criteria.

#### (b) Income Tax

The entity has self-assessed as exempt from income tax under the provisions of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997 (Cth) and, accordingly, no income tax expense, current tax liability or deferred tax balances are recognised in the financial statements.

The entity reviews its tax-exempt status annually to ensure it continues to meet the relevant legislative requirements.

#### (c) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Cost of inventory is determined using the first-in-first-out basis and is net of any rebates and discounts received. Net realisable value is estimated using the most reliable evidence available at the reporting date and inventory is written down through an obsolescence provision if necessary.

#### (d) Property, plant and equipment

Each class of property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation and impairment.


Items of property, plant and equipment acquired for significantly less than fair value have been recorded at the acquisition date fair value.

##### Depreciation

Property, plant and equipment, excluding freehold land, is depreciated on a straight-line basis over the asset's useful life to the Association, commencing when the asset is ready for use.

### 3 Material Accounting Policy Information

#### (e) Financial instruments

##### Financial assets

All recognised financial assets are subsequently measured in their entirety at either amortised cost or fair value, depending on the classification of the financial assets.

##### *Classification*

On initial recognition, the Association classifies its financial assets into the following categories, those measured at amortised cost

##### *Amortised cost*

The Association's financial assets measured at amortised cost comprise trade and other receivables and cash and cash equivalents in the statement of assets and liabilities.

##### *Trade receivables*

Impairment of trade receivables have been determined using the simplified approach in AASB 9 which uses an estimation of lifetime expected credit losses.

The amount of the impairment is recorded in a separate allowance account with the loss being recognised in finance expense. Once the receivable is determined to be uncollectable then the gross carrying amount is written off against the associated allowance.

Where the Association renegotiates the terms of trade receivables due from certain customers, the new expected cash flows are discounted at the original effective interest rate and any resulting difference to the carrying value is recognised in profit or loss.

##### Financial liabilities

The financial liabilities of the Association comprise trade payables and grants.

#### (f) Leases

Lease payments are expensed monthly in profit or loss as incurred and are presented within operating expenses. No right-of-use asset or lease liability is recognised in respect of these arrangements.

#### (g) Employee benefits

Provision is made for the Association's liability for employee benefits, those benefits that are expected to be wholly settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

Employee benefits expected to be settled more than one year after the end of the reporting period have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits. Changes in the measurement of the liability are recognised in profit or loss.

### 4 Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The directors make estimates and judgements during the preparation of these financial statements regarding assumptions about current and future events affecting transactions and balances.

These estimates and judgements are based on the best information available at the time of preparing the financial statements, however as additional information is known then the actual results may differ from the estimates.

The significant estimates and judgements made have been described below.

#### Key estimates - grant income

For many of the grant agreements received, the determination of whether the contract includes sufficiently specific performance obligations was a significant judgement involving discussions with a number of parties at the Association, review of the proposal documents prepared during the grant application phase and consideration of the terms and conditions.

Grants received by the Association have been accounted for under both AASB 15 and AASB 1058 depending on the terms and conditions and decisions made.

If this determination was changed then the revenue recognition pattern would be different from that recognised in these financial statements.

#### Key estimates - receivables

The receivables at reporting date have been reviewed to determine whether there is any objective evidence that any of the receivables are impaired. An impairment provision is included for any receivable where the entire balance is not considered collectible. The impairment provision is based on the best information at the reporting date.

#### Key estimates - employee benefits

As described in the accounting policies, provisions are measured at management's best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period. These estimates are made taking into account a range of possible outcomes and will vary as further information is obtained.
