Bond:	\$23- (the bond will be returned to you from Nominate upon you leaving your stable/s clean of all manure and hay)


Camping: \$25 per night (per site) or \$75 for whole event - all sites are powered

#### **Refunds:**

No refund for scratchings after close of entries unless accompanied by veterinary/medical certificate. A 30% administration fee will apply on the total entry including Camp/Stable fees. Certificates are to be received by the OC within 7 days of commencement of competition.

Refunds by Maryborough Showgrounds will only be considered within 24 hours after the conclusion of the final day of the event. A stable or yard bond is charged automatically when stables or yards are booked. If your stable/yard is left clean, you will be refunded the bond to the credit card that was used to book. If your stable/yard is left unclean, you will forfeit the bond and it will not be refunded to you.

## **IQ STATE CHAMPIONSHIPS 2019**

This event is being conducted under the rules as per the IQ Handbook 2019 and the EA and FEI Rules where applicable. It is your responsibility to read your Handbook.

During the planning and organisation of this event, all due care will be taken to ensure the safest possible conditions exist for the riders and horses. However, it is the responsibility of each competitor to comply with safety standards set down in the competition rules. The organising committee for this event will endeavour to see these standards are complied with.

Neither the organising committee, Interschool Queensland, Equestrian Australia, Equestrian Queensland, Fraser Coast Regional Council, accepts any liability for any accident, damage, injury, illness to riders, spectators, horses, grounds or any other persons or property whatsoever in consideration of entries being accepted. No entries will be accepted unless riders and parents have signed the Acknowledgment and Indemnity waiver.

#### Compulsory Team Co-ordinator's Meetings:

Please note that each evening at 6pm (or after presentations) there will be a compulsory Team Co-ordinators' meeting held in **Hall Two** to provide competitors with important information about the next day's competition. We ask each school to provide a representative to attend these meetings. At the introductory meeting on the Tuesday night we will ask for their name and contact details to be provided.

#### **Photo Release Waiver:**

By attending this event you are consenting to your child/children and yourself being photographed or filmed. EQ may use these images for promotional use in the Interschool program, this includes but is not limited to, use on the EQ website, marketing material and in all forms of media. Photos in which your child/children appear may be submitted to EQ, partners and stakeholders who may also use these images for the purpose of promoting their association with EQ.

#### **ENTRIES & SUBSTITUTIONS**

Riders/Horses must be registered with Interschool Queensland. **ALL Horses must be EA Life registered** and **ALL Riders must be EA Competitor Junior members** to compete at this Championship event.

**The Organiser reserves the right** to cancel any class or event; to change the competition schedule at any time; to divide any class; to transfer competitors between sections of a class; to alter advertised times; to accept and/or reject entries.

Competitors are reminded that Medication Control (swabbing) can occur at <u>any</u> event run under Equestrian Australia rules and regulations.

Riders may enter a maximum of 6 classes per horse across the State Championships. However, for scheduling reasons, riders may have to make a choice between classes if there is a time clash. The total classes allowed will not include Eventing or Combined Training as it is held at a separate event. Show Horse and Showman will count as one class for each horse/rider combination competing in the discipline.

Riders are asked to consider the welfare of the horse when considering their state classes. The organising committee reserves the right to discuss the number of entries for a horse/rider combination per day if they have concerns.

## A rider can enter a maximum of two horses in each discipline providing that each horse/rider combination is qualified:

- For Dressage- each horse can compete in a maximum of two classes. A class is two dressage tests at one level. For riders entering two classes on a horse, these classes must be at consecutive levels. Rider/horse combinations may also enter a freestyle class provided that the "no more than 3 tests in one day rule" is observed.
- For Jumping- each horse can compete in a maximum of two classes. A class is three show jumping tests at one level.
- For Showman Competitors may enter a maximum of two horses.
- For Show Horse Competitors may enter a maximum of two horses.

## Show Horse and Showman riders are not able to use results from the previous year's state championships as qualifying results.

#### Substitutions:

On approval from the IQ committee, riders may substitute an alternative **<u>qualified</u>** horse up until the start of competition for the day providing details of the IQ horse/rider registration is presented to the organising committee. No rider may be substituted for another.

Important note for riders wishing to compete in more than one discipline: The organising committee will endeavour to structure the draws such that riders may compete in two disciplines on the same day, but riders must

# understand that, if this is not possible, they may have to prioritise one discipline over the other.

### Horses:

Horses are not to be ridden by anyone other than the rider nominated on the draw at events from midday on the day prior to the event commencing until conclusion of the final discipline on the last day of the event. This ruling applies even if a horse has completed its competitions at an event. The exception to this ruling is that a horse can be ridden by more than one sibling rider at an event in different disciplines as long as each rider has their unique IQ number for that particular horse and the horse does not compete in more than the maximum number of tests/sections allowed in the day by EA discipline rules (eg, no more than 3 dressage tests in one day).

## **Primary & Secondary Riders:**

Rule 5.2 of the IQ Handbook 2019 states that riders compete in Primary and Secondary School Divisions as per the EA Interschool Rules - (EA Rule 10.2.2 )

**Primary competition** is restricted to athletes enrolled up to and including year 6 in the year of competition.

The **Secondary competition** is for those enrolled in years 7 to 12 inclusive in the year of competition.

In the Dressage and Show Horse competition there are **Intermediate Secondary** and **Senior Secondary** categories. Intermediate is defined as those athletes enrolled in years 7, 8 and 9. Senior divisions are for those athletes enrolled in years 10, 11 and 12 in the current year.

## Note all year 12 riders are asked to indicate this in their nominations.

## **Cancellation of Event:**

In the event of cancellation of the competition or part thereof due to any circumstance beyond the control of the IQ organising committee, entry fees will be refunded less \$35 administration costs to help defray costs.

#### **Disputes:**

No competitors or parents are to directly approach any judges, stewards, course builders or any other officials or volunteers before, during or after the competition with disputes or complaints.

Any disputes, complaints or queries during the event must be lodged in writing with the fee of \$100, as per rule 6.1 in the 2019 IQ Handbook, to the TD via the school convenor **within 30 minutes** of the posting of the scores which gave rise to the objection. The decision of the Technical Delegate/Ground Jury will be final and may not be appealed. General questions can be asked in relation to errors on results or in relation to the running of the event through the event office.

#### **CONDITIONS OF ENTRY**

#### **PIC Number/Horse Health Declaration Form:**

For information in relation to travel permits & spraying please contact your local Department of Primary Industries. It is a requirement for entry to this event that all competitors provide a current **Horse Health Declaration form** for each horse entering the showgrounds.

The Horse Health Declaration form can be found at

This completed form must be handed into the event office (as per event map) on arrival at the venue or at the welcome night. Please ensure you have provided a PIC number and that you enter this PIC number on your nomination form.

#### \*A rider's arm band will be issued on receipt of the Horse Health Dec form to the event office. This armband must be worn to allow the rider to pass through gear check during this event. NO ARMBAND = NO RIDE.

**Horses-**Do not take sick horse/s to this venue. Practise good biosecurity before, during and after going to an event. Horses must not be tied to any fences or trees. Horses must not enter the camping areas. Do not erect electric tape or portable yards. Do not dump manure from trucks/trailers anywhere other than the allocated stable waste points. Do not put manure on trees. Leave stables, camp areas and arenas clean and tidy. A cleaning fee is charged for stables or yards not left clean after the event and any stable waste and manure not deposited at the designated stable waste site. Horses, when not being trained or exhibited, must be kept in allocated stables or yards.

#### **Behaviour/Code of Conduct:**

When representing their school and while on competition grounds, all competitors must obey their school rules and competition etiquette. Those not adhering to these, risk elimination from the competition. Damage to any third party by anyone at the venue of the competition will be the responsibility of the adult involved or the parents or guardians of those who caused the damage. In particular IQ and the EA accept no responsibility relating to the use of motorised vehicles on the grounds over the course of the competition.

As per the Equestrian Australia 2019 National Interschool Rules, and Member Protection Policy it is expected that athletes and their support teams will adhere to the rules of the competitions in which they participate and that they will show respect for other competitors, their horses, officials, judges and administrators in their actions and their words.

There are formal mechanisms for requesting clarity of committee decisions and for disputing results. Whilst each discipline has rules and regulations specific to that discipline available for download from the EA website, the conduct of members of the

sport overall is controlled by the Member Protection Policy.

There are also general competition codes of conduct that apply to ALL Interschool competitions. Breaches of these general conduct practices will result in disqualification from the competition and depending on the severity of the offence, the athlete and/or their associates may face disciplinary action.

At an Interschool event, the Organising Committee, the Technical Delegate/s, the Ground Jury and Officials are responsible for ensuring Horse Welfare guidelines and EA Codes of Conduct are observed.

The following EA Codes of Conduct must be observed by all competitors and their parents/guardians, during any activity held or sanctioned by EA – including Interschool events – or as an athlete/participant in any activity held by or under the auspices of the organisation or one of its affiliates. Those who fail to do so risk elimination from the competition.

- For competitors
- For officials
- For spectators

- For administrators, directors & officers
- For parents & guardians
- For the welfare of the horse

#### **Venue Information:**

#### No motor bikes, four-wheelers, trikes and other vehicles are to be used at Maryborough Showgrounds, other than by the OC

**Bikes/Scooters-** Riders are required to wear approved helmets at all times and riders must stay away from stables, all horse warm up and competition areas.

**Camping and Stables**-Camping and parking of vehicles are allowed in designated areas only. Horse preparation, working areas and stables and yards are separate from the areas designated for parking and camping. Horses are not permitted in camping and parking areas.

**Dogs-** Dogs MUST be leashed and under control of the owner/handler at all times. **The owner of any dog on the ground accepts the responsibility of the consequent action caused by the dog**. All dogs must be restrained at all times. Please ensure that dog droppings are picked up and disposed of appropriately.

Also please take note of the following Maryborough Showground rules for Dogs;

Dogs are not permitted in horse areas, including spectator and judging areas, at any time. Dogs are permitted in camping areas and must remain tied up or on a short leash within this area at all times.

**Glass:** - No glass is permitted. CANS AND PLASTIC BOTTLES ONLY.

**Fires -** The lighting of fires anywhere on the grounds is prohibited unless approved by the Council's Maryborough Park Coordinator.

#### Children

Children must have adult supervision.



### **COMPETITOR INFORMATION/ CONDITIONS OF ENTRY**

#### **Competition Schedule:**

The competition times in the published schedule are correct at the time of publication and should be taken as a guide for competitors only. The final schedule draw will be posted on the morning of each competition day and available on the event Team App.

Rings may run early due to scratchings. Please be attentive to announcements to this effect on the day. Riders may be required to ride earlier.

Riders who are late, without prior approval from the OC (e.g. let the office know if you are held up in another ring), may be excluded from the class.

#### **Rider Numbers:**

Correct IQ numbers must be shown on **both** sides of the horse when competing. The IQ number should also be displayed on the horse at any time the horse is taken out of its stable or yard, being led, being ridden or lunged on the grounds at an event.

#### **Unmounted Presentations:**

Please refer to the information about presentation attendance in the 2019 IQ Handbook.

Presentations will be held at the conclusion of each day's event at the Main Grandstand. **It is compulsory for all riders to attend presentations** on the days they compete. This is considered appropriate protocol for a State Championship and the committee expects schools and parents to support this expectation. All riders must be in full uniform (including helmet or team caps). Failure to comply with this rule will result in any awards, points or ribbons being forfeited. A request for an exemption is possible if presented in writing/via email (<u>interschoolqld.secretaryevents@gmail.com</u>) **prior** to the event and will be considered by the IQ State Committee. In the case of an emergency during the competition please contact the IQ State Committee Chairperson, Clinton Peters (0409 773 885).

#### Scoring of Trophy Points:

The scoring for Champions, Teams and Overall Trophies are outlined in the current IQ 2019 Handbook.

*The overall perpetual trophies will be presented at <u>the Eventing and</u> <u>Combined Training State Championships</u> in Warwick.* 

## **Compulsory Helpers Roster:**

Each rider will be required to nominate a helper for the event. This year, we are using the **`Sign-Up' App** to manage our helpers roster. Please access the website or download the app and familiarise yourself with it. It is easy to use and it allows you to choose jobs that suit your schedule and family. **This system was used at the 2018 Nationals and it worked very well.** 

#### How it will work:

We will open the State **'Sign-Up' Helper's Roster** at 7pm Friday 21st June, it will remain open until Tuesday 25th June at 7pm. Job choice will be on a **'first in'** basis. To ensure you obtain your preferred jobs/times it is advised you sign up early.

Families are asked to select 1 job for up to 2 rides, eg

- if you have one child with 1 ride, select 1 job
- if you have one child with 2 rides, select 1 job
- if you have one child with 4 rides select 2 jobs.
- if you have two children, one with 2 rides and 1 with four rides, (ie 6 rides) select 3 jobs.

If all jobs are not filled, we may ask families to choose another job.

If families do not select their jobs by the close-off point on <u>Tuesday 25th June at 7pm</u> they will be allocated any remaining jobs. Reminders will be sent prior to the opening and closing of the 'Sign-Up' roster, but we ask you to take responsibility for signing up within the required timeframes.

We will post the completed 'Sign-Up' roster at the venue and the 'Sign Up' App will send out automatic reminders so ensure you check your emails. It is the responsibility of each rider and their helper to ensure that they check the 'Sign-Up' roster and complete their nominated tasks or find an appropriate substitute person to do so.

#### Helper Sign In Procedure at Event

Helpers must register at the nominated area prior to start of their allocated job. This will be different for different disciplines so consult the final published roster to see where you need to go.

If the helper fails to arrive for duty as per the roster, the rider's name will be forwarded to the IQ State Committee on the day of the Competition and the rider will be ineligible for placings or points for that Competition.

The rider will NOT be eligible for prizes at the State competition and will be automatically considered as riding HC for the event. This will mean the rider will also be ineligible for a place on the Queensland State Team to compete at the Australian Interschool National Championships.

Please do not put the committee or your child in this situation.

#### **Horse Welfare:**

Horse abuse in any form will not be tolerated. If horse abuse is determined the athlete will be disqualified from the competition. The sighting of blood on the horse during a test, whether wet or dry, will entail elimination and/or investigation by the Ground Jury/Technical Delegate based upon the Sport Rules of the discipline involved.

#### Soundness:

The Judges are required to satisfy themselves regarding soundness of all horses and therefore have the authority to stop an unsound horse during the competition or from competing – any disputes in this area will be considered by the ground jury on the day and/or the Technical Delegate. For Dressage there is no appeal against this decision.

#### **Clean Sport:**

Now is the time for a reminder that the use of prohibited substances in your horse is not tolerated and riders must be aware that random swabbing of horses may occur at random and will be conducted at any of these events. You should consult with your Vet regarding any current treatment and should be aware of the potential risk of selfadministration of prohibited substances.

The FEI publishes a caution against the use of herbal supplements and products of which the ingredients are unknown. The use of any substance to affect the performance of a horse in a calming (tranquillising) or an energising (stimulant) manner is forbidden. The use of a calming product during competition may also have important safety consequences.

#### Saddlery and Equipment:

**MARSHALLING/GEAR CHECK.** A designated marshalling/gear check will be made available and is compulsory for all competitors prior to their entry in **each phase of every class.** Competitors are to check into marshalling 15 minutes prior to ride time. Competitors may not compete until they have been cleared through marshalling/gear check.

NOTE: Armbands must be worn to be cleared through gear check.

For Dressage, riders may undertake their gear check process up to 20 mins prior to ride time. This is to allow those riders that so choose, to have an uninterrupted warm-up period prior to their test. Where possible, marshals will assist riders to move through to their correct ring at the correct time, but this is primarily the responsibility of the rider.

All equipment must comply with EA regulations for the particular discipline. It is the

<u>responsibility of the competitor and/or parents</u> to ensure that saddlery and equipment is in good repair, meets the relevant safety standards, is fitted appropriately and meets the regulations for that event. **It is not the responsibility of the volunteers at Marshalling/gear check.** Please refer to the illustrations of allowable equipment and information in the EA Rule Books and the information specific to each discipline in the IQ 2019 handbook.

## **Dress for Riders:**

Except where Sport Rules allows otherwise, riders and drivers competing in an EA competition, must wear an approved helmet with the chin strap fastened at all times. The same is recommended when riding a horse at any time. Protective headgear must conform with one of the current approved safety standards:

- Current Australian standard AS/NZS 3838 (2006 onwards) provided they are SAI Global marked.
- New Australian standard ARB HS 2012 provided they are SAI Global marked.
- Current American standards ASTM F1163 (2004a or 04a onwards) provided they are SEI marked.
- Current American standard SNELL E2001.
- Current British standard PAS 015 (1998 or 2011) provided they are BSI Kitemarked.
- Interim European Standard VG1 (01.040: 2014-12) with or without BSI Kitemark.

#### **Back Protectors:**

Back Protectors for jumping elements are not compulsory under EA rules. The IQ strongly recommends their use in the interest of safety.

Providing qualifying criteria is met, a rider may ride a maximum of two horses in up to two classes per horse. For riders entering two classes on a horse, these classes must be at consecutive levels.

Each class or overall championship is comprised of two dressage tests. In many cases, both tests are ridden the same day: D1, D3, D4, D5, D6 and D7. In some cases, however, the tests will be ridden over two days. These classes are D2, D8 and D9. Regardless of the structure of the tests (over one day or two days) please just nominate/enter your class <u>once</u> for each horse/rider combination.

*Classes D10 and D11* Make up the Small Tour Championship and is deemed as one class. Riders can enter one part, but the **Overall Championship is D10 and D11 combined.** 

\*Classes D12, D13 and D14 will not qualify riders for selection to the 2019 National Championships but WILL count towards rider, team and school points.

#### Secondary riders: Intermediate and Senior categories

In the Dressage competition, there are categories for Intermediate Riders and Senior

Riders. Secondary Senior Riders are riders in years 10, 11 and 12. Secondary Intermediate Riders are riders in years 7, 8 and 9.

Classes D1 and D2 are for all riders in Prep–6 and D3 to D11 are for riders in years 7-12. Classes D12, D13 and D14 are open to para-equestrians, RDA riders and Riders with a Disability.

Riders who have an EA Exemption card may ride in classes D1-D11 and/or classes D12-D14. All PE riders at the time of nomination must send copies of their classification card and any other exemptions to the convenor, Sue Sampson at <u>sue.sampson@icloud.com</u> prior to acceptance of the nomination.

**Callers:** Callers will be allowed for **Primary riders** but we do encourage experienced /older Primary riders to consider riding without a caller, in readiness for possible selection for the State Team and to help prepare for Secondary Dressage competition.

The dressage competition is run under EA and FEI rules and the IQ 2019 handbook.

**Class limits and Qualifying criteria for Dressage:** As per Section 7 of the IQ 2019 Handbook.

Class numbers <u>will</u> be limited and entries will be ranked to determine acceptances for any classes with entries over the class limit of 35. Please advise of any withdrawals as soon as possible so that riders on the reserve list may be notified.

**Total Freestyle numbers (across novice, elementary, medium, advanced and inter 1) may also be limited.** The cap is yet to be determined and will depend on the final schedule but a cap of 20 freestyle riders may be imposed. If this occurs, and entries exceed the capped number, then the entries will be ranked to determine acceptances for classes.

#### **Prizes:**

Awarded to 10<sup>th</sup> place in each class.

Overall placings will receive Comets to 6<sup>th</sup> place, ribbons from 7th to 10th place. Champions receive rugs and Reserve Champions saddle blankets. Teams awarded to 6<sup>th</sup> place.

#### Important note for riders wishing to compete in both the Dressage and Showjumping events:

#### Rings WILL NOT BE HELD for riders coming from Showjumping to Dressage or vice versa.

#### YOU MAY BE REQUIRED TO MAKE A PREFERENCE ON THE DAY.

**Interschool Show Horse** consists of classes for Show Horse, Show Hunter and Working Hunter. Each class has three (3) phases: an In-hand presentation, Rider phase (judging the rider) and Ridden phase (judging the horse). Working Hunter includes a Jumping phase.

The same horse/rider combination must complete all phases in the order specified in a timed draw as determined by the Organising Committee.

The Rules for Interschool Show Horse have been designed to correspond with the National Show Horse Rules wherever possible, however some variations have been necessary to meet Interschool competition requirements. Judged under current EA SHOW HORSE RULES.

**<u>Competitors please note</u>**: to reduce the impact of clashes, classes for **Show Horse** will be run in the following order-

- 1) Ridden
- 2) Rider
- 3) Led

- **Secondary riders** who wish to be considered for the **State Team MUST** enter the FREE Qualifier classes 50, 51 or 52. Their results from the previous classes will not be considered.
- **Primary riders** who wish to be considered for the **State Team MUST** enter classes 20,21 or 22- results from classes 10 or 11 will NOT be considered.
- Riders must complete all phases in the class on the same horse.
- Each class will have a timed draw and all riders will complete an individual workout for each phase.
- Safety of all the Interschool athletes is paramount; thus, the Organising Committee has the right to determine in which order the phases will be held.
- Competitors may walk the jumping course for the Working Hunter Competition prior to the start of the first held phase of the class for the competition.
- At IQ if the incorrect equipment is worn into an arena in front of the judge, the rider will receive a **ZERO mark** for that phase, ie if spurs are worn in the Led phase or if gaiters or long boots are worn in the Rider phase by riders under 18 years of age.

#### **Dress, Saddlery and Equipment**

Will largely be as per National Show Horse Rules with some exceptions specifically for Interschool Show Horse competitions. Please refer to the Interschool Handbook for these exceptions

### **Number of Horses**

- Competitors may enter a maximum of two horses in the Show Horse competition.
- Rider and horse/pony combination may compete in one class only, and must choose between show horse, show hunter or working hunter.

#### Workouts

• Set workouts for all classes are available on the IQ Website. And will also be sent out with the draws.

#### Prizes

- Awarded to 10<sup>th</sup> place in each phase.
- Overall placings will receive Comets to 6<sup>th</sup> place, ribbons from 7th to 10th place.
- Champions receive rugs and Reserve Champions saddle blankets.
- Teams awarded to 6<sup>th</sup> place.
- Ribbons will NOT be awarded for the Secondary Qualifier classes.

### The order in which the phases occur is as follows:

- 1. Phase 1 EA Dressage Test;
- 2. Phase 2 Individual Ridden Display;
- 3. Phase 3 Working Hunter (Jumping) in four phase classes only;
- 4. Phase 4 In-Hand Presentation.

## **Rules Particular to Showman**

As the Showman competition is designed for a rider to progress through each phase in sequence the rider must compete in the same saddlery for all phases. Please be aware that while Showman follows the rules of the relevant EA disciplines, as all phases follow each other there are a few important differences in some of the equipment permitted. Refer to the IQ Handbook for rules particular to Showman.

## Scoring in Showman

In this discipline each of the three or four phases is scored equally out of 100 marks. Marks are then added to identify the winner who will have the highest overall marks.

## Elimination will occur for the following reasons:

- Completing the phases in the incorrect order;
- Elimination from one phase entails elimination from the class;
- Fall of horse or athlete;
- Leaving the designated competition arena before completing any of the phases;
- Performing the wrong work-out (ridden or in-hand).

#### Prizes

- Awarded to 10<sup>th</sup> place in each class.
- Overall placings will receive Comets to 6<sup>th</sup> place, ribbons from 7th to 10th place.
- Champions receive rugs and Reserve Champions saddle blankets.
- Teams awarded to 6<sup>th</sup> place.
